EDUCATIONAL.

THE COMMON SCHOOLS AND SOLDIERS

Local Statistics of General Interest, State Superintendent Wickersham in his annual report makes the inquiry and asks for a decision whether, in view of the biennial sessions of the Legislature his reports are to be annual or biennial. He pronounces the general condition of the school system good. During the past year 233 additional schools were graded, making the whole number of this class of schools 7,037. The whole number of pupils on the rolls was 937,310, and the average attendance 601,627, or 77 per cent. While the increase in the number of pupil was 1,570, the increase in the average attendance was 13,955. Owing to the depression in many kinds of business at the beginning of the year, when they were fixed, there is a small decrease in the salaries of teachers but the average length of the school term remains almost the same. The average cost of tuition for each pupil per month is seventy-five cents. The ex-penditures of all kinds for the year, not neluding orphan or normal schools amounted to \$7,482,577.75. The school property of the state is valued at \$25. 467,097. Total debt of school districts \$2.648,495.84, balances in treasuries \$1,-425.213.16. The recent unhappy delays in paying school appropriations are referred to and relief is asked. The losses by the delay last year and the discount of warrants was

Popular Interest. There never was a time when the popular interest in public education in Penn-

sylvania was so general or so deep. During the years of the hard 'imes, now happily past, it is true there were not so many school houses built, nor so much money spent for improvements, but the average ength of the school term has remained about the same, and there has been a very small reduction in the amount paid for in struction. Graded schools have continued to multiply, and the improvement in courses of study and methods of teaching has been very marked. Educational meetings and teachers' institutes have increased in numbers and attendance in all parts of the state, and more articles on education have appeared in our newspapers and magazines in the last five years than in any previous ten years since the public chool system was organized.

The weak points in the present system are held to be the requirement of duties from directors for which too often they have no qualification. The building of school houses, selection of books and suspension of teaching are matters for expert knowledge. The superintendent dilates on the point and cites statistics to prove that ignorance is the mother of crime. Many children are not in schools who could storing their power to throw off disease. be brought in by the directors; legislathe compulsory education of neglected children and some scheme to take little ones out of the poorhouse and

bring them up properly.

The normal schools are highly commended and also the system of superintendency, which is invogue in sixty-six counties and twenty-six cities. The salaries are fixed and the conventions to elect superintendents next May need be distracted by no question except to find the best men. The present Lody of county superintendents is praised as the best ever had and many suggestions from their reports are given by Dr. Wickersham, among them the following of local interest:

Superintendent Shaub, of Lancaster, would like to see the whole school law revised, especially in respect to "county institutes, length of school term, branches to be taught, attendance, and payment of school warrants. " Superintendent Buehrle, of Reading,

now of Lancaster, proposes a periodical school census, that the number of children not in school, and growing up in ignorance, may be ascertained.

Legislation is urged to revise the school laws, to furnish free text books, to educate neglected children, to build school houses, and for closer supervision.

In the tables of statistics it appears that in all, from the beginning, the state has appropriated to the Millersville normal ol 879,063.30, Lancaster county has 8742,705 worth of school property; 115 permanent certificates; 306 school grounds of sufficient size; 195 suitably improved; 445 school districts ; 51 houses of frame, 294 of brick or stone; 18 built last year, and 38 unfit for use; 133 badly ventilated; 46 without a proper privy; 154 first class: 358 suita bly furnished; 147 with injurious furniture; 29 furnished last year ; 4 with good apparatus; 94 without any; 17 graded schools, 5 more needed, 93 well classified; 555 with uniform books; 543 in which the Bible is read; 86 teach drawing, 83 teach vocal music; 47 teach some of the higher branches; 62 hold public examinations;

271 visited by directors; 430 provisional certificates; 22 professional; 156 applicants rejected; average grade of certificates 2 ; 305 male teachers ; 251 female ; av erage age of teachers 26; 53 inexperienced 299 have taught more than five years; 476 intend to make teaching a permanent business; 212 have attended a normal school; 62 graduates; 555 have read books on teaching; 34 have held professional certifices; 55 permanent certificates; 444 visits by county superintendent, average visitation, 1 hour and 30 minutes; 132 schools not visited; 206 directors accompanying; 196 patrons met, 84 schools regularly visited by directors; 83 by patrons; 2 district institutes; 9 meetings held by county superintendent; 376 childdren of age not in school; 3 academies;

210 pupils in them, and 8 teachers. Lancaster city having only recently been created a district superintendency its statistics are included in the above for the county. It has 65 schools; 7 male, and 58 female teachers; 3,473 pupils; average cost of tuition per month 84 cents per pupil; value of school property \$143,750.

The Soldiers' Orphans' Schools. The cost of this system for the past school year was \$351,431.59, and the appropriation \$360,000, leaving an unexpend ed balance of \$8,568.41. The whole ordinary cost of the system from the beginning to May 31, 1880, was \$6,313,526.80. The extraordinary expenditures amount to \$25,395.43. As the law now stands no children can be admitted after June 1, 1882, and three years after all the schools are to close. Should the law be unchanged the appropriation to be made for the support of the orphan schools for the two years cannot be very materially reduced. For the year 1881 \$360,000 will be needed and for 1882, \$340,000 making in all \$700,-

The total number of orphans under care of the state is 2,580, of whom 312 are at the Mt. Joy school. The number at the same time last year was 2431, the increase being 149. There are also about 200 applications on file that have been acted on and accepted, and the children are waiting admission. Of those at school the religious connections of 405 are not reported Methodist parentage, 869; Lutheran, 310; Presbyterian, 295; United Presbyterian, 18; Baptist, 142; Episcopal, 105; Catholic, 63; German Reformed 109; Disci ples, 23; Church of God, 18; United Brethern; 53; Tunkers, 6; Congregationalists, 3; Albrights, 3; Evangelical, 24; Protestants (probably not intended to repre sent any particular denomination), 120 : Universitists, 5; Friends, 5; Puritan, 2; Unitarian, 2.
