### TORN FROM HIS HAND. A Jailer Maitreated and Forced to Surreuder His Keys

A special despatch from Norwich, Conn. says : The news of a desperate attempt at jail breaking in Windham county, several miles to the north of this city, has just reached here. Yesterday morning Wil-liam Hanlon, James Roland and Thomas Smith, who were awaiting trial in the Brooklyn jail for extensive burglaries in Willimantic, were let out of their cells with the rest of the prisoners for the purpose of washing. Awaiting a favorable opportunity, when Jailor Cox had his back turned, the three men knocked him down from behind, hurling him with good for the stage floor of the prison such force on the stone floor of the prison hall as to partially stun him. He, how-ever, pluckily held fast to his keys and maintained for several minutes a violent struggle against fearful odds, the men threatening his life if I:e did not give them up. At length they were torn from his hands after these members had been terribly beaten. Then, again threaten-ing to kill him if he followed them, the trio leaped for liberty. A deep snow impeded their progress, and a prisoner, James Shirley, raising the alarm, a large posse of citizens at once started in pursuit of and captured the misoreants atter a hard chase of three hours. The men made no resistance, being tired out and unarmed. Selins Grove Times. The same pair of bluebirds have for some years come to our lot and raised two or three broods of young every summerfour birds at each hatching. After the first brood can fly well, the birds all at once disappear. In ten days or two weeks the old couple return, build a new nest and hatch another brood. So soon as they can fly well they again all disappear. In October they all return to the old home, where they sport about a week or two, and all at once leave for the South. Last fall they returned again in October—eight in number—showing that two were miss-ing. Cold weather set in early, but still the bluebirds were about as late as the 24th of November, showing by their behavior that something was wrong. They lived mostly on dried grapes and the shells of grapes. About Nov. 24, they all disappeared—the weather getting too severe for them. But about the middle of December two of the birds again put in an appearance and were about every morning till Dec. 22, when they were heard no more. These two were either the lost young ones or the old ones which had re-
