Winter Care of Fowls. While writing, the thermemeter stands 80 below zero. On the morning before the mercury marked 10° below. In places within a distance of less than a mile, the temperature is much lower, where the location is in a hollow. Such cold weather generally comes once or twice every winter. For this emergency every careful person has prepared be orehand. During the few previous weeks, when the weather might be termed moderate beside that which we are at present experiencing, the fowls have been comfortable, enjoying their out-door run each day at the warmest portion. The ground being uncovered, they have gathered grass and gravel, and belped themselves to drink, at the regular watering places of the barnyard stock, returning early to their warm roosting places. The wise poulterer has prepared for any emergency, and the fowls are as safe as now, when the door is closed at night, as in the warmer weather. The house has been previously furnished with drinking vessels, nest boxes, and every appliance of comfort beneath a southern ex-

posure of glass. The poultry keeper should, with the rising of the sun, go with fresh feed to see whether there are any frosted combs. If there are they should have immediate attention before thawing. Frosting may be easily discerned by the white appearance. Avoid touching or bruising the frozen flesh, but catch the fowl and breathe gently on it until the ice comes out, after which dress with olive oil, care being taken not to wet the feathers. Do not remove to a stove, but allow the bird to remain in the same place. As the sun comes up and the fowl stirs around, the blood will circulate, and the thawing is less painful when the ice comes on the outside. There will seldom be a case so extreme as this, with the careful attendant, and in quarters that are reasonably comfortable. If fowls are accustomed to the outside air each day, they will endure quite severe cold without suffering. But if fowls are placed in confinement under glass covers at the first approach of cold weather, they become tender. The combs and wattles are forced to a greater size, and hence the danger of frost in the long winter nights, when the thermometer drops suddenly below zero. I have found it the better way to keep the fowls accustomed to the atmosphere as much as pos sible without suffering. In this manner they come into laving without much forcing, and are robust. Aside from the combs and wattles, the

They will endure the greatest degree of cold without injury, if duly trained to it, and give the greatest quantity of eggs with the least feed and care. They are bright and lively and every mouthful of food tells on them. With the exception of exhibition birds, it is better to breed for low combs and acclimate to the cold. Side by side with the Whites, the Browns will exect, they will endure more hardships and yield greater profits on the same keep. Fowls should not be allowed to drink in rigid atmospheres. They cannot do this with safety to the combs and wattles except in the warmest portion of the day. Of course daily exposure is a drawback to their laying, but is more advantageous to their health. In cold weather give scraps and fatty substances, together with the

whole corn, as these are heat-giving substances, and create warmth of body. It fowls are kept in comfort and thrift through the cold wave, they will keep in profit, but they must have strict care.—
