The professor says that the thirteen-year brood will probably be seen in Southern Illinois, in all of Missouri except the northwest corner, in Louisiana, Arkansas, Indian territory, Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina and South Carolina. The funded debt as above matures in 1885 and 1890, and at intermediate periods at the option of the city. In fixing the valuation of the real estate owned by the city, the committee are of opinion that they have placed the properties at an undervaluation of what they would realize if put upon the market. The city pays nothing for the use of water for its fire department and other purposes through its 340 plugs. Water rents for 1880 amounted to \$35,920.19, and rents from markets to \$8,900. For the sinking fund \$25,000 was redeemed in 1880, reducing the funded debt that amount. Valuation of taxable property for 1880 was \$11,500,000.
