Tobacco.

The New York Market-Seed Leaf and Havana,

United States Tobacco Journal. The market is stiff. Notwithstanding the large number of failures in the trade, holders of '79 tobacco believe they will obtain big prices and profit in the future. A belief in the truth of the adverse reports of the condition of the '80 Pennsylvania crop appears to have taken firm root. Nobody in need of tobacco during this year or next, seems willing to give these reports the benefit of the doubt. Manufacturers mean to be sure of the supply of leaf, and not trust to probabilities. The consequence is they are buying '79 leaf willingly, if not eagerty, and quite a rise in prices is per-ceivable. Jobbers, however, are more cautious. To buy '79 leaf at present prices is hazardous for them. The small manufacturer who has to pay them a profit cannot make any money on the tobacco, and consequently will find difficulty in paying for

The '79 crop of all growths contains but little heavy yielding material Nevertheless, at low figures it can be worked with profit. At high prices it is an absolute impossibility to manufacture it profitably. Those manufacturers who bought when '79 stock was low (a couple of months ago, when this paper advised its readers not to rely upon any further fall in prices) have not raised the prices of eigars. There fore, it is difficult, if not impossible, for anybody to compete with them who has to pay considerably more for leaf than they

The hopes of all jobbers are centered in the '80 Pennsylvania. They know that the crop, as a whole, will be bought cheaply, and its comparative cheapness will make up for its defects. These de fects are acknowledged to consist of little punctures in the leaf made by insects. It is claimed three-fourths of the crop is affected in that way. These tiny holes, though very abundant, are not very hurtful. But packers of experience hold that such holes in leaf grow larger after the tobacco has sweated and dried out, and the leaves containing them cannot be used for wrappers. We leave this opinion to the consideration of our experienced cigar manufacturers.

It is difficult to form any opinion of the condition of any of the '86 crops, as a whole. The extremely cold weather does not permit of their being inspected. A week of warm weather may change the condition of thing very materially.

The sales of the week we specify as follows : Pennsylvania—Crop '79 : 1109 cases; fine running, 22 to 23 cents; medium, 15 to 20 cases; low, 13 cents and upward; fillers, 81 cents. Connecticut-Crop '79: 560 cases; wrap-

pers, 38 to 40 cents; running, 15 to 23 cents; seconds, 131 to 14 cents. Wisconsin-Crop '79: 300 cases; Hayana seed, running, 16 to 17 cents; 100 cases

Philadelphia Market. Seed leaf moving nicely; ail grades receive full share : some first-class packers have sold \$10,000 worth of Pennsylvania at splendid figures for the Pacific coast. San Francisco. Leaf-This trade is fair and indeed has picked up a little since the holidays, though transactions are yet small, hand-to-mouth affairs, and probably will be until after the Chinese New Year. The quality of the stock of Pennsylvania wrappers of 1879 is thought by some to have improved during the past two months. Prices are or 5 pounds for \$!. not satisfactory to importers, and afford a very narrow margin over cost and freight. The reports of the 1880 crop lead bolders of 1879 to believe that they will, in the near future obtain better prices for good wrappers of the latter year than buyers are now willing to give.
