The Boss Sled.

Connecticut's Colossal Double-Ripper Graphically Described. The Bridgeport Standard in a recent issue says: "Norwich and New London seem to think they own the champion double-runners in the state. Pooh! Pooh! Bridgeport has turned out a double runner thirty feet long which can and has carried thirty-two men, averaging 150 pounds apiece, or 4.800 pounds. The sled was built by Julian II. Sterling, is made of ash, twelve inches wide and one and one-half inches tlack, has rests for the feet running the whole length, and wings over the front sled to protect the dress from the fifth wheel. Round handles also run along the sides to hold on by. A truss similar to those under drawing room cars strengthens the sled sufficiently to carry any weight that may be needful. It has a brake so powerful that by pulling a small ring at tached to the levers the entire load is lifted, and slides as if it were scated on a bar-

row, the steel points of which cut the ice and stop the sied in almost its length. "So nice have been the experiments with steel polished by ice that in some cases a steel runner will slide better by turning it end for end, the grain of the steel running back instead of forward and producing a slight triction. The steerer sits in front and steers by hand, the ropes running through pulleys so arranged that with his little finger he can guide the load, and instead of steering 'to a hair,' he can steer to a razor's edge, which will split a hair, and then, if necessary, can stop on a wasp's sting, which is the finest point he knows of. A fifteen-inch gong on the under side rings as an alarm while coasting, and if any car, hack, or sleigh should get in the way the steersman, with such sensitive apparatus, can either slide around

the obstacle or stop. "This beautifully constructed runner cost \$150 and the builder says it is the champion double runner of the state for money.' Statesmen, bank presidents, doctors, lawyers, scalptors, artists, poets and ladies have helped to make the loads, and are united in praising the merits of this wonderful sled. A mile in thirty seconds is nothing, and the builder is inventing, a new one, which, if it strikes an obstacle, will shut up like a telescope, the last man put it in his pocket, and the load slide through a canvas fire escape on to the sidewalk.

Corn Stalks and Sorghum.

Dr. Peter Collier, of Washington, made some interesting remarks at the last meeting of the National Agricultural association concerning the valuable process of extracting ugar from corn-stalks and sorghum. He said :

"During the past year there have been examinations made of 38 varieties of sorghum grown in, and received from, 14 different states, and from 9 varieties of Indian corn. The results from analyses made, 1,318 in all, of the sorghums, showed them to yield on an average 1,662 pounds of available sugar. From four of these varieties the sugar was extracted in quantity and at a rate of fully 2,000 pounds per acre. As to the corn-stalks, For the convenience of those who cannot the results were most satisfactory, but the experiments were not so numerous as with sorghum. An average of 26 analyses of the 9 varieties examined showed them to contain in their juice an amount of sugar greater in quantity than the average of the best 30 specimens of 50 specimens of sugar-beets grown in different parts of the country. After a large crop of ripe corn had been gathered, the stalks yielded at the rate of over 900 pounds of sugar to the acre, and there appears no reason to doubt that this result could be obtained upon a large scale. In view of these results I feel justified in saying that there appears no reason to justify us in importing sugar which would not justify our importation of corn and wheat. In view also of the gradual but decided improvement of our Western lands, which a carefully compiled result of the acreage yield for the past 18 years establishes, it seems most wise that we turn our carnest attention to this question of sugar production. You are also aware that the ash of corn is composed of matter derived from the earth, and unfortunately consists of those two substances least abundant and most valuable, viz., phosphoric acid and potash. Indeed, so great is our corn crop—occupy-ing 37 per cent, of our cultivated lands in the United States as it does-that at the prices we pay for these two substances the amount present in our corn crop aggregates the enormous sum of over \$100,-000,000, while the entire value of our corn crop is about \$500,000,000, so that when the time comes, as come it may, that to keep up the fertility of our Western lands we must return what we take from the ground, it will require, as will be seen, a sum equal to 20 per cent. of the entire
