Yesterday afternoon Frank Herr went to the top of the house at Third and Union streets (wherein his father's store is situated) to clean the snow from the roof, he tied a rope around his waist and attached the other end to a chiangey. The precan-tion taken probably saved his life, as before he had worked many minutes, he lost his footing and was carried over the edge of the roof, just below which he was held by the rope until assistance could be rendered and he released from his dangerous and uncomfortable position.

### The State of the River.

The ice has moved at Baldwin; the river is rising four inches per hour at Collins and an inch an hour at Columbia. The warm weather of the past couple of days is certainly telling upon the solidity of the sheet of ice before us, and unless the weather changes within the next couple of days a break-up is inevitable. Since yesterday the river has been rising fast and there has been no let-up this morning. It is reported that last night's rise at Marietta is fully 21 feet. The ice has moved from a point in front of the Henry Clay furnace, but from the dam to the tunnel it is still apparently firm. Just where the ice which moved has gone to is a queare the local ogents. tion. It is either gorging above here or filling bare places which, by the way, repeated walks have not discovered to us. The next couple of days may tell a tale.

### THE THAW.

# Ice Moving on the Streams.

The thaw of the past three days has had the effect of raising the water in all our neighboring streams and breaking up the ice in some of them. The ice below the city mill, on the Conestoga, passed off about half-past four o'clock this morning without doing any damage ; Lut on reaching the site of the dam at the old factory it gorged and the water rose rapidly six feet or more above its former level. No damage has thus far been done. The ico remains solid on the dam at the city mill.

The ice at Levan's mill on the Conestoga, remained firm at noon, but was be ing worn away rapidly by the swiftly running water and the heat of the sun. At 2 o'clock this afternoon the water at that point had fallen four inches.

The Pequea and Mill creeks are bank full, and at Colemanville, on the Pequea, there was last evening a gorge of ice cight feet high, which dammed the water and made the ford unsafe.

The Susquehanna at Columbia remained firmly ice-bound this morning, though the river had risen two or three fect. It was thought it would require a six-foot rise to break the ice.

To- day a great deal of ice and water have been coming down from the Cocalico and Muddy creeks-tributaries of the Conestoga. The Cocalico is said to be very high and much gorged in the vicinity of Ephrata. Messrs Wolf and Sollenberger in attempting to cross the bridge back of Frey's mill in Eprata township, had their sleigh struck by a large cake of ice and unset, throwing them and their team into the stream. The men with difficulty escaped, but the horse, a valuable one was drownod. The loss is said to be \$225.

At one o'clock this afternoon there was a gorge of ice ice 8 or 10 feet high at Woodward rock on the Conestoga back of Woodward Hill cemetery. There is also said to be a great gorge of ice at Rock Hill on the Conestoga a few miles above Safe Harbor. The ice is reported to have passed out of the mouth of the Conestoga.

The IMg Beaver creek, in the vicinity of Neff's mill, near Strasburg, is reported to be at high flood and gorged in several places.
