And After that Time a Movement to Release the Imprisoned Man. Mr. E. B. Stout, an aged citizen of Cin cinuati has left for Columbus to petition the governor for the pardon of Ferdinand Seitz, whom a jury of which Stout was a member sent to the penitentiary for life, thirty-three years ago. Seitz was then a young man of 25. He had fallen in love with Katrina Addam, a comely German girl, on her way from Germany here, and after their arrival asked the father for her hand. The old man refused. Seitz and the daughter pleaded in vain. Finally the father, to get rid of Seitz, urged him to go a short distance into the country to rent a farm. They went together. A few miles out the same afternoon, old Addam was found shot and his brains beaten out. An hour later Seitz was talking with some men near by when the flies were seen to cluster about his knees and thighs. The mer suspected something wrong, and, forcing him to remove his outer garments, found his drawers stained with blood beneath his dark trousers. He was convicted on circumstantial evidence and sent to the peni tentiary for life. He refused to confess, and the thirty-three years he has been in prison he has constantly asserted his innocence. Of the judges, sheriff and officials that served in the case all are dead save the venerable Judge A. G. A. Carter, who was then prosecuting attorney. Seitz, who is now nearly sixty, and has spent considerably more than half of his life
