# COLUMBIA NEWS.

OUR REGULAR CORRESPONDENCE.

As the figures given in yesterday's INTELLIGENCER showed, the election of Tuesday in this borough consisted in nothing more or less than Democratic gains, and the result, although not giving the democracy a majority, either the school board or council, will give them a hold, and a good hold, too, which it will require at least three years to loosen. Two out of three of the justices of the peace are Democrats—a gain of two; then in the election of their candidate for chief Burgess they were successful; they gain one councilman and possibly two, and one school director. Two constables have been gained to the Democrats—one in the First and one in the Third wards. The total gain is seven, and if Gen. Wm. Patton is successful, full council it will be eight. The Columbia Council, in taking a peep at its profit and loss account, was sorely displeased and comes out in a not very enviable humor. It says: "We think those kickers who were back on the regular ticket at our borough election on Tuesday, broke their faith as well as their Republican necks. If they want Democrats to rule, they should go over body and breeches to that party. Out with such weak-kneed Republicans! Shame, disgrace and confusion of face to the whole gang of them—we had plenty of just such people during the war." As the editor of the *Courier* is a "stairway," he is excusable. It is strange to say W. W. Hayes' *Columbia Herald* came out without a single notice to grace the heads of its columns—stranger still when it is remembered that Gen. himself was elected justice of the peace in the Second ward. But then we presume the usual modesty of the *Herald's* editor got the upper hand of his inclination.

George Niesley, residing in West Hempfield township, has sold his tobacco crop of 1880 at 24 and 25. It realized something like \$23,000.

The ice gorge of a couple of days ago tore out about twenty feet of the wall of the Pennsylvania canal at a point about 150 yards west of the tunnel. The wall was of stone and was very strongly built. It being repaired.

At a special meeting of the school board, held an evening or two since, one week's leave of absence was granted to Prof. B. G. Ames to visit at some of the public schools at Pottsville to look into their system of school government. Mr. Ames hopes to receive many valuable suggestions.

The telephone people are now on their way to Market and connection will be made before the close of the present month. It is thought that a couple of the furnaces at Chickies will be connected this week.

Company H has secured quarters at No. 417 Second St., N.W., Washington, D. C., for its stay while at the inauguration. There are about twenty-five more companies than the company can use, and a committee has been appointed to rent them. Any of our citizens who have not prevented stopping places may find it to their advantage to call on the committee.

Market has been reported to have been quite brisk this morning. It is expected that the ice, which was thrown on the railroad track at Port Deposit, by the gorge of a few days ago, will be removed by this evening. Every effort is being made to clear the track, at McClellan's Ferry, of the immense quantity of ice which is now piled there. The Pennsylvania bridge will be replaced in position by the time the track is cleared of the ice and it is now thought that the road may be gotten in running order again by Tuesday or Wednesday next.

The water at this point is very free of ice. The water has again been let out of the canal between here and Chickies.
