Misery in Minnesota. The Supply of Fuel Consumed and Wheat Used for Cooking Purposes. Major B. A. Brackett, deputy United States marshal, and Colonel J. D. Curcey, who have returned to St. Paul. Minu., after being snowbound fourteen days at Appleton, and in the vicinity of Bigstone county, report the situation in that section as tearful.
