#### An Historic Parallel.

A student dressed as an Esquimaux in fuzzy garments intended to represent fur, set fire to his clothes while lighting his eigar and at once losing his ran furiously in of mind his fright among a group of others in similar attire. The clothes of number of these took fire, and the cable tells us that four of them were burned to death. It strangely recalls in its circumstances a frightful event which nearly five centuries ago convulsed mediaval Paris. When Charles V. of France was a convalescent after the attack of lunacy which came upon him during his August march against the Duke of Brittany, a masquerade was given at the Hotel St. Paul in honor of the wedding of a widow lady in attendance on his queen. To amuse the king a certain Hugh de Guisay, one of his courtiers, got up a sextet of satyrs, consisting of the king, de Guisay himself and four other courtiers, all of whom were attired in cloth smeared with rosin and covered with tow, the object being to make them look like goats. The king thus disguised was tormenting the young Duchess of Berri when the Duke of Orleans, the Count of Bar and sundry other semi-royal youths coming to the masquerade thought it clever to set fire to the tow worn by one of the king's companions. The dresses worn by the satyrs, smeared with rosin and covered with tow, were of linen and sown on the bodies of the wearers. In a moment the unhappy man was in a blaze and ran wildly howling about the hall. For this act he was expelled by the faculty, who soon after were petitioned by the graduating class to allow him to finish with them, as he had so nearly completed his course, and had also been given a speaker's place. Toombs himself petitioned them, but both we: refused. He apparently submitted, but on commencement day, when the chapel was crowded with visitors, and the seniors vehemently orating preparatory to receiv-ing their diplomas, he stationed a brass band under the spreading limbs of the oak, whose music succeeded in bringing scores of town people, who were not then in the chapel, and also of clearing it of nearly all its audience.

Then, in as cool a manner as possible, he placed himself in a chair and made an oration such, it is said, as was never spoken by a student here before or since. He never received his diploma, though after his celebrated Boston speech it was sent to him, but was returned with the answer, "D-n the diploma; when it would have been an honor to me I was refused it; now, when I am an honor to it, it is offered me." He was afterwards reconciled with the faculty, and is now one of the staunchest supporters of the col-
