Change of Fingers.

A Novel Surgical Experiment which Two Men Undergo for Money.

The Cleveland Herald says : Yesterday a report reached the Herald regarding peculiar treatment on the part of a resident physician. Dr. Banton was found at his office, and to inquiries from the visitor made the following interesting state

"For some years I have made the sub ject of engrafting one of study, and so con fident was I that it could be performed that on last Wednesday morning I deter mined to make the venture. Frank and August Filer, aged respectively 25 and 28 for a considerable sum of money were prevailed upon to subject themselves to the ordeal, and at 9 o'clock myself and assistant amputated the little finger through the shaft of the second phalanges of the right hand of August and the analagous finger on the person Frank, engrafting the part amputated from one person to that of the other, putting four sutures in each. The fingers were dressed and the men departed with strict injunctions to say nothing about the matter and to return on Thursday to have their fingers redressed. During the operation quite an amusing acci-dent took place. The little finger of Mr. Frank Filer had been amputated, wrapped in a towel and placed on the steam heater. My assistant, in looking for something to wipe the blood from his hands, took the towel and noticing the finger. When I came to look for the linger, after the one on the hand of August bad been amputated, for the purpose of placing it on his stump, I found it goue, but, after an auxious search of a few minutes, I happened to glance in the slop backet, and saw it floating on the surface. It was quickly rescued, placed on the stump and band-

"The entire operation was performed in less than an hour without the use of amesthetics or of stimulants. Notwith-standing my expressed wish, the men went down street, exposing themselves to the rain and dampness, and at every opportanity told the story of the wonderful experiment, contrary to my instructious, desiring to make nothing public until the experiment was proven beyond the possibility of a doubt.

"Twenty-four hours later the men returned and had their fingers redressed, which were found in a very promising condition, notwithstanding the exposure that the men had subjected there to. There was a union of the parts and a partial circulation, giving a normal appearance to the fingers as far down as the nail. The continuity seemed perfect and one of the men said he had sensation in the member. I propose to watch the cases and give them my most careful attention."

English Farmers in Despair.

The Lifect of Bad Barvests and of American Competition. The London Economist says: "It may be from fear of America, it may be from the long continuance of unprofitable har vests, it may be from the rise in the expenditure especially upon labor, or it may even be from increased intelligence, but there is a hopelessness about farmers' complaints which experienced men, familiar with their ways, never remem-ber before. They hardly took for any improvement. They do not speak of the bad times as exceptional. They do not, among each other, talk of prices as sure to improve. Above all they throw up their farms on apparently light provocation. Experienced land agents notice a total difference of tone and disposition to haggle, a sort of determination to make none but low offers, and to stick to them. The tenants, as they say, seem not to want the farms, and make offers too low to be entertained, in a kind of spiteful sport. Very often no offers at all can be obtained, and the land is either thrown upon the landlord's hands or goes out of cultivation. The latter occurrence was formerly most unusual in Great Britain, and seems almost impossible; but there is no reason to doubt the statements made that in every county in the South and East large numbers of farms formerly yielding good rents farms formerly yielding good rents are lying idle, the landlords being unwilling to let at low rents to men who ask long leases, and unwilling to cultivate for themselves or able to bear a temporary loss. We know in our own experience of a district in which eleven farms, poorish to fair as to soil, are deserted and untilled, and have read advertisements of a quite extraordinary character in the way of temptation to tenants. Of farms in the landlords' hands, and of farms broken into two or three, there is no end, while land in modest patches has sunk in value in a degree which suggests a kind of dread among tenants as well as land bayers. There is a feeling of hopelessness, in fact, abroad among farmers of the better class, and of reluctance to remain in the business, which of itself may produce important effects, willingness to farm having been an
