Salt on Wheat.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Dec. 10, 1880. R. E. Monaghan, Esq: DEAR SIR: Your letter of Dec. 6, re-

My experience with salt is confined to one trial during the past season with one bushel of common Michigan salt sown on 14 acres of old land, after the wheat was sown and harrowed in the spring. In a 60-acre field, one acre was carefully measured and threshed by itself, where the salt was not sown, and it produced 34 bushels machine measure, and weighing out 36 bushels. measure, and weighing out 36 bushels, ficted with while the average yield was 24 bushels. The wheat produced on salted land test-

ed 58 pounds as it came from the machine while no other part of the field tested over 57 pounds. · the season was rather wet and I did

not anticipate so favorable a result as though it had been dry. I am so pleased with the result that I shall try to salt my whole field, at the rate of \ of a barrel, or about 200 pounds to the acre. I made my experience from information

obtained from Wisconsin farmers, who claim that salt will increase yield eight bushels per acre.

The best of my wheat being one pound on the bushel more than that produced from any part of the field, convinces me that the salt is a very necessary ingredient to our land in wheat raising.

I also find that harrowing the land after the wheat is up several inches does it much good. Any further information I can render you of interest will be cheerfully given. Yours very truly, A. H. REED.
