Interest two hundred thousand dollars of the bonded indebtedness of the city of Lancaster, the Mayor of the city is hereby authorized to issue certificates of indebtedness of said city to the amount of fifty thousand dollars, in such forms as are now provided for the issuing of the same; said certificates to be of denominations of one hundred dollars, five hundred dollars and one thousand dollars, redeemable in lawful money of the United States at the pleasure of the city after one year and within twenty years from the date thereof, and to bear interest, psyable semi-annually in such lawful money, at the rate of four per cent. per annum; also like certificates to the amount of fifty thousand dollars, the same in all respects, but psyable at the pleasure of the city after five years, and within twenty years from the date thereof, and to bear interest at four per cent. per annum; and also like certificates to the amount of one hundred thousand dollars, the same in all respects but psyable at the the pleasure of the city after five years, and within twenty years from the date thereof, and to bear interest at four per cent. per annum. Said certificates shall not be liable to local taxation, the interest on the same shall be made psyable at the office of the Tressurer of the city of Lancaster, and they shall have set forth and expressed upon their ace the above specified conditions.

Sao. st. That the Mayor of the city is hereby authorised and empowered to sell and dispose of any of the certificates of indebtedness of the city of Lancaster.

But it has nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to authorize any increase of the indebtedness of the city of Lancaster.
