Tobacco Stems as Menure.

Country Gentleman. In this county, where tobacco is the great, and I might almost say the only paying crop, it is often planted for several years in succession on the same land. Therefore our farmers, of very necessity, must turn to profit everything that will, in the shape of manure, increase the yield of their crops; and, from long experience they have found that there is nothing superior to the coarse stalks of tobacco. Every one is saved; every one is utilized, and there is no question but thay they are profitable. It is not necessary that they should receive any special preparation for use. Many mix them in the barnyard with stable manure, where they readily absorb the liquid manure, and rot as fast or faster than corn stalks. They are then applied similarly, and along with the other manures, for any crop needed. The ravages of the potato-bug having almost rendered it impossible to grow a crop of that vegeta-ble, some one advocated planting potatoes along with tobacco stalks as a preventive. For one year it seemed to be the thing needed; but the second year, when more generally tried, it was found to be of no use. Many, however, in this experiment for an insect prevention, found out that it greatly increased the yield of potatoes, and rendered them entirely exempt from harm from the white grub, which, in some localities, does so much to the injury of

Therefore, from one reason and another tobacco stalks are more or less gradually being looked upon as especially adapted for a manure for potatoes. The stalks are cut very easily on a power fodder cutter, and if cut in the winter when filled with frost, and piled away, they will heat and by spring will be found in a most per-fect condition for application to any crop needing ready manure of great strength They were also used throughout this locality (as stated on page 83,) to keep the slugs off rose bushes and the different iniurious insects from fruit trees, and even now it is no uncommon sight to see orchards of several acres with a dozen or more stems around the foot of each tree. Opinion is much divided as regards their worth in this particular. The stalk being hollow, I am inclined to think from my own experience, and from observation in the orchards of my neighbors, that the parent moth of the different injurious insects lays its eggs in these stalks, and that when they are gathered up and taken away at the proper period it is a benefit. If left there through the season, they are of no use, only in the shape of a fertilizer, concerning the value of which in this country there is only one opinion. C. C. Tobacco Plant Beds.

W. H. White. The time for preparing plant beds and covering seed is close at hand. Upon the care bestowed upon the preparation, seeding and after treatment of the bed depends largely the success of the crop. Unless we have plenty of good plants in sea son, the crop is late in maturing, often not developing full growth. It is not well to sow the seed too early, as frosts often destroy the young plants. The ground should be free of frost and work without being pasty; crumbling when turned. The surface should be rich and the soil made very fine before sowing; and then we find it better to sow so thick that the plants will fully occupy the whole surface, rather than sow so thin that weeds grow instead, although the thin seeding gives the more stocky plants, provided the weeds are kept out entirely. Still, with heavy seeding there is usually no trouble in obtaining good plants, where proper after-treatment is given. Instead of spreading one tablespoonful of seed over 100 square yards of surface, I have found it preferable to apply ten times that quantity. Great care is to be used in scattering the seed evenly over the whole sur-

Unless there is plenty to feed on, the plants will not grow, but take on a yellow, sickly appearance; therefore guano and other fertilizers are applied much more liberally than otherwise would be the case. If the bed never has been used for the purpose before a cart load of good stable manure is none too much to plow under, and four quarts of palverized guano must also be worked into the surface of a bed 16 by 20 feet. Then sow the seed, and either roll with a heavy roller or tread the surface. A close fitting board frame to surround the bed is a good thing to keep off intruders and answers well to support and hold a cloth covering in case it is desirable for starting the plants early, or to protect from frosts or insects. Cheap unbleached cotton sheeting is as good as anything, and is better than glass, as it requires less attention and costs only a fractional part as much. Where the tobacco fly troubles the plant bed it would be well to try fencing them out in this way. Radish seed might be sown outside around the bed for the fly to feed on, in addition.


