LENTEN DISHES.

HINTS TO HOUSEKEEPERS ABOUT WAYS OF COOKING FISH.

Delicious Soups Without Meat—Boiled at Baked Fish and Fish on Mate-lotte—Wine and Fried Bread.

To keep Lent strictly, in so far as abstinence from meat is concerned, is by no means to fast, since exceedingly dainty dinners may be prepared in which no re course is had to the butcher. Tradition tells us of a Lenten dinner given by an archbishop of Rheims which consisted of sixteen courses and from which meat was of course, wholly excluded. Fortunately for epicures fish abound; the succulent oyster is still in season, and the toothsome shad makes its appearance in Southern waters. Delicious soups may be made from fish stock, while vegetable purees are excellent with milk and a modicum of butter in place of meat stock. Eggs may be cooked in many fashions, and vegetables-thanks to the steam canneries-ar plenty. But it is upon fish chiefly that the Catholic or Episcopal housekeeper re-lies chiefly for her Lenten bill of fare. The manner in which fish should be cooked depends, generally speaking, upon the size. A large fish should be boiled or baked, a small one broiled or fried. In preparing fish for cooking as little water as possible should be used and the fish carefully dried with a cloth.

According to Miss Corson, who has come to be the foremost American authority, in boiling fish those of large size should be placed in water cold and well salted, while small fish may be put direc'ly into boiling water. Others recommend that the water be always cold at first. Half a teacupful of vinegar-in Europe claret is used-corrects the muddy taste of some fresh water without imparting any acidity. Sliced lemon and a few cloves and peppercorns or a "bouquet" of herbs will addd to the flavor of boiled fish. This "bouquet" of herbs is composed of a little bay leaf, a stalk of celery, a dozen of cloves and a dozen peppercorns tied in a bunch of parsley.

If the flesh of a fish to be baked is some what dry an improvement will be effected by cutting diagonal slashes along the side n each a slice of fat There should be no water in the baking pan, but olive oil, fresh butter or salt pork can be used. The ordinary brown meat gravy warmed will be found excellent with baked fish. Brown sauce, often used with baked fish is made by putting in a thick saucepan for one pint of sauce a tablespoonful of butter and one of flour stirred over the fire until brown, then adding slowly one pint of water, stirring all the time that it may be smooth, and

seasoning with salt and pepper.

In broiling fish, the gridiron should be buttered and the flesh side placed next the fire first and broiled to a light brown, while the skin side should be more thoroughly cooked to a dark color. Maitre d'hotel butter is au excellent addition to broiled fish. This consists of one tablespoonful of butter, one of parsley chopped fine, one teaspoonful of lemon juice, one saltspoon of salt, and one-quarter of a saltspoon of pepper. This is mixed cold and spread over the fish on coming from

For Broiled Mackerel a la Maitre d' Hotei .- After taking out the gills and inside, clean and dry the mackerel with a damp cloth (it should never be washed for broiling), fold in an oiled paper and put on the gridiron. When done on one side turn on the other, then remove the paper and dress on the dish in which it is to be aug28-1yd] served; split it down the back and put in a lump of butter mixed with finelychopped parsley and shives well worked into it, adding salt and pepper and a squeeze of lemon juice. Serve before the butter is quite melted.

Fish can be fried to the best advantage in good olive or sweet oil. When this be comes so hot that a light blue vapor arises drop the fish in and fry to a light brown. If much frying is done this oil can be used again and again. Either fresh butter or beef-drippings rank next, though common sweet lard is usually used. Many small fish are improved by being dipped cracker crumbs before frying. All fried fish should, as soon as coooked, be laid the in the beaten yolk of an egg and rolled in upon brown paper, which will absorb the

In addition to these usual methods, a fish may be stewed. Miss Juliette Corson's recipe for fish en matelotte is as follows: Cut up the fish in two-inch pieces and put them over the fire in cold water containing a tablespoonful of salt, an onion stuck with cloves and two tablespoonsful of vinegar. Boil for fifteen minutes, then take up the fish, dry in a clean towel, roll in flour, and fry in a saucepan with two ounces of butter. When brown add a bouquet of herbs and pint of boiling water. Season the matelotte with a teaspoonful of salt and a quarter saltspoonful of pepper. Peel a pint of button onions, toss over the fire until brown with a teaspoonful of butter and of sugar, and add to the matelotte, to simmer on hour. If the sauce evaporates add enough boiling water to make up the original quantity. When the matelotte is done add a glass of wine and serve with croutons of fried bread.
