THE NEW YORK MARKET.

Seed Leaf and Havana—For the Week End-ing on Saturday March, 26.

U. S. Tobacco Journal. With the exception of sales of about 1.200 cases of '79 Pennsylvania, in lots of from 50 to 150 cases, and 500 cases of '79 Ohio, there was not much business transacted, the spirit of the market being generally dull and inanimate. The main reason for this comparative quietness is assigned in the lack of activity in cigar manufacturing circles, which is almost general. This inactivity would not prevail if the elements had not disturbed com nunication with the principal cigar con-suming sections of the West. Consequently, large manufacturers are not in the humor to invest in old leaf to any greater extent than probable or urgent

necessity demands. Such a condition of affairs in this market at this time of year is generally apt to affect operations in green tobacco in the country. Buying of '80 crops was not carried on last week with the vigor that characterized several of the preceding weeks. An uncertainty of purpose among the buyers has been quite noticeable.

Even in this state, where it was thought that investments in the '80 crop would be extremely safe, a wavering is reported in purchasing. Perhaps the packers have discovered that it is not all gold that glitters, or, better, that it is not all wrappers that are long.

It would be folly to attempt to give any opinion now of the condition of the crops, and only the actions of the individual buyer can be taken as a guide, a poor one, we must admit, to form an opinion upon,

The actions of buyers of '80 Pennsylvania certainly show the application of considerably more judgment than was shown by them in their purchases of the '79 crop. The haste and scramble, so to speak, with which that memorable crop was secured by them has not been repeated. Carefulness in the selections of crops is a practice now in vogue, the purpose of which some of the editors of the Lancaster papers are at loss to understand. The lower grades of the '80 Pennsylvania crop remain very much neglected, and, as we mentioned last week, the policy to rather invest in '80 Ohio or Wisconsin than in the low grades of '80 Pennsylvania, is beginning to be carried out. At least new and more numerous arrivals of packers in Ohio and Wisconsin are reported.

Outside of the above mentioned sales of '79 Pennsylvania and Ohio in our market, at figures equalling those paid during the past two months, we notice sales of only a few hundred cases of '79 Connectiout wrappers at 23 to 36 cents. There is still a large quantity of this tobacco in the market, and jobbers can only be induced to take hold of it at exceeding low figures. Should the market not improve speedily, holders will likely accede to the views of obbers. There were reports of sales of a few hundred cases of '79 state and Wisconsin, but nothing definite regarding them could be ascertained.

Havana-In livelier condition than seed leaf. Out-of town orders from manufacturers are reported quite numerous, and consequently changes of many parcels in this market took place. The sales are summed up to 1,100 bales, three-fourths of which were of the '79 crop; balance consisted of '80 crop. Prices remain unchanged.

The Philadelphia Market. Dealers report old desirable stock difficult to obtain, with prices entirely too high to be profitable to manufacturers. A fair trade doing, but no rush. Prices still maintain steadiness, and appear at present to be favorable to holders. The weather this spring has so far been against business; we look for a change in both ere long. Our packers are moving in the new leaf in the various states.

Total, 2,511 cases.

Recent Neighborhood Sales. Samuel P. Marshall, of Birmingham township, Chester county, sold his extra fine crop of leaf tobacco to a gentleman from Lancaster county, the prices paid were 16, 7 and 3 cents per pound. Mr. Marshall had one of the best crops in that section of the county. The same pur-chaser bought the crop of James Kirkpatrick, whose farm adjoins that of Mr. Marshall, for 18, 6 and 3 cents per pound.

The Coatesville Times says: R. E. Smith, tobacconist of this borough, has bought the entire stock of eigars from a manufacturer of fine cigars at Scheneck, Lancaster county. The amount paid for stock amounts to nearly \$9,000.

John Miller, of Bainbridge, so'd 1,500 lbs. of tobacco to Fatman & Co. for 15, 5 and 3. The tobacco was delivered on Saturday.

The Duck Island Crop. Tobacco Leaf.

The tobacco crop in the Duck Island, Bucks county, district is beginning to move, which is a satisfaction to the growers. It has been very quiet here all this winter. Nearly all the tobacco is packed away in boxes, awaiting the arrival of purchasers. Every week the amount of sales increases, and one or two good buyers could soon take all there is in the district. While last year produced some poor crops, there are others in this district as good as was ever grown. Up to the present time, over twenty crops have been disposed of. Now would be an excellent time for some of the Lancaster buyers to visit this dis trict. There is no flea bite here to give them trouble. The first of April will soon be here, and the growers-some few of them-would like to sell before that time to be prepared to close up the year's trans

A Widow's Discovery.

Letters Among Her Dead Husband's Effects Showing That He Had Another

A Mr. Joseph Wagner, who was said to possess considerable property and who lived with his wife in the Second district of Baltimore county, died on March 5.
