ANOTHER FATAL ACCIDENT.

Man Killed on the Raitroad. Yesterday afternoon about 2 o'clock as the fast line west was passing McIlvain's lime-kilus, a short distance east of Leaman Place, the locomotive struck and instantly killed an unknown man who was standing on the track, looking at a train that was passing in an opposite direction. There is a rather short curve in the road at that point of the accident, and the unfortunate man could not see the train until it was almost upon him, and the noise made by the other train no doubt prevented him from hearing it. He was thrown some distance from the track, when struck by the engine, but was not much disfigured His remains were taken to Leaman Place where an inquest was held by Deputy Coroner J. M. Deceased was well dressed, appeared to be about 35 years of age, 5 feet 6 inches in height, and rather stoutly built, and probably a German. He had black hair, goatee and moustache.

THE CULORED TROOPS.

Fighting Bravely for a Snare of the

Washington, D. C., April 2.-A dele gation of colored men representing a convention of colored Republicans recently held in Baltimore waited upon the president to-day and presented through their spokesman, Isaac Myers, an address setting forth the grievances of the colored Republicans of Maryland, and asking at the hands of the president a fuller recognition of their claims. It is stated that notwithstanding the colored men constitute more than a majority of the Republican vote in the state, and but for them there would now no Republican representatives in Congress, they were almost ignored in the distribution of federal patronage in Baltimore. The president replied briefly that he would examine into the matter complained of; that in the appointments to public office fitness and the qualifications of the individual should be considered the color, whether black or white, could in itself be neither a recommendation nor a bar.

BIG BLAZE.

A Million Dollar Fire in Ciacinnati. CINCINNATI, April 2.-At 2 o'clock this morning a fire originated in the central building of the Robinson wagon works fronting on the Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton railroad north of 8th street. Three hundred wagons stored the yards were soon in blaze. All the factory buildings were on fire and the railroad cars on the track were endangered. Two relays of engines were called. The Robinson wagon factory. a brick structure newly built, 60 by 100 feet, and 5 stories high, was completely destroyed. The loss is from \$500,000 to

\$600,000; partly insared. The flames extended to Adam Moore & Co.'s varnish factory, a three-story brick building; also to the Queen City varnish factory, a two story brick building, which were burned. The loss is estimated at \$1,000,000.

Suicide in a Baltimore Hotel. BALTIMORE, April 2.—A young man who registered his name as J. P. Ames, of Pittsburgh, Pa., at Pepper's hotel on Tuesday last, committed suicide about twelve o'clock to-day, by shooting him-self through the head with a pistol. He was aged about twenty-eight years and of very gentlemanly appearance and deport ment. In his pocket was found a bill of the Bolton hotel Harrisburg, dated April 1st. His face is very fair with a light brown moustache, and he is well dressed.

Minister White's Resignation WASHINGTON, April 2.—The resignation of Andrew D. White as envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary at Ber-lin, Germany, has been in the hands of the president several weeks, coupled with the request that his successor be nomithe public interests.
