them) -voted for Shirk. McComsey was declared elected, and the same process was gone through with on all the other offices. Daniel Trewitz Mr. Geo. W. Zecher, of the Sixth ward, and received 29 votes to 16 for Peter B. Fordney, nominated by Mr. Barr, of the Third For this office Hays voted with the Democrats for Trewitz, but on all the other votes recorded his ballot with the Repub-

For superintendent of the water works. Davis Kitch, nominated by Mr. Brown, of the First ward, was elected by a party vote (19 to 17) over Jacob Halbach, nominated by Mr. Doerr.

For city solicator, Jacob L. Steinmetz, esq., nominated by Mr. McMullen, of the Second ward, was elected by the same vote over Charles I. Landis, esq., nominated by Mr. Walter M. Franklin, of the Fifth

For principal regulator, James C. Carpenter, nominated by Mr. Borger, of the Seventh ward, was elected by a party vote over Wm. R. Gerhart, nominated by Mr. George M. Franklin, of the Fourth.

For assistant regulators and chain carriers, Alex St. Clair, nominated by Mr. Boos, of the Eighti, and Joseph Brientnall, nominated by Mr. Johnson, of the Sixth, were elected-19 to 17-over Isaac Hubley, nominated by Mr. Walter M. Franklin and Frederick Miller, nominated by Mr. Doerr.

For messenger, Jacob Stormfeltz, nomi-nated by Mr. Lichty, was elected over John II. Loucks, nominated by Dr. Davis. President Evans declared the result as

City Treasurer-William McComsey. Street Commissioner-Daniel Trewitz.

Superintendent of the Water Works-City Solicitor-Jacob L. Steinmetz. City Regulator-James C. Carpenter.

Asst. Regulators-Alex. St. Clair and Joseph Brientnall. On motion of Dr. Davis (Rep.) the election of all the above named officers was

made unanimous by acclamation. There being no further business before the convention, an adjournment was made on motion of Select Councilman Geo. M.

Both select and common councils then re-assembled in their respective chambers. In the former body a joint resolution for the appointment of all the joint and standing committees as heretofore, and providing that the street committee shall consist of one member from each ward was adopt ed. Common council concurred. Also a joint resolution providing that the former rules of intercourse between the two bodies, as printed in the digest of 1880 be re-enacted for the ensuing year. Adopted by select council, and concurred in by common council. Each body adopted also a resolution providing for the government of its proceedings according to the rules printed in digest of 1880. Both bodies then adjourned.

The only other matter touched upon at to-day's meeting was the long continued delay in transporting the remains of the late Senator Carpenter to Wisconsin, and it was agreed on all hands that the members of the Senate committee appointed for this purpose should make immediate arrangements for pairing and proceed to perform their mission.

RUSSIA.

Some Rigorous Measures Adopted. LONDON, April 4 -A dispatch from St. Petersburg to the Times says : " The first measure established by the new elective council of twenty-five, has been to invest the city with a chair of Cossacks patriots, with posts of officers and police on all the roads, so that no ingress or egress of per-sons is allowed until subjected to a strict investigation by the commanders of the posts. Not even special passports are yet permitted. A second measure is now beng elaborated by which every traveler arriving at a railway station will, after examination by the police, be handed over to a cabman, who must deliver him at the designation declared to the police, or promptly report any change in the designation. A third measure was proposed and vigorously applauded at a general meeting of the 228 deputies composing the temporary council, but as yet the council of 25 has refused to sanction the measure. which was that certain members of the council should take turns in watching the streets through which the emperor might pass, thus incurring grave responsibility should anything untoward occur. The boat upset and Wright and the unknown man were drowned. Frazer was found elinging to the boat, still alive.

A Terrible Suspicion. GREENFIELD, O., April 4.—John Barenberg, a wealthy farmer, was taken from beneath the heels of a horse in his stable this morning terribly mangled and dead. Examination of his injuries leads to the suspicion that he was murdered and robbed and then thrown into the stall to hide the crime.
