TOBACCO.

THE NEW YORK REPORTS. Seed Leaf and Havana Last Week.

United States Tobacco Journal. No change has taken place in our market this week, and evidently the spirited and extensive business in '79 stocks has come to an end. Whatever there is left of '79 Pennsylvania is in the hands of jobbers, who do not care very much to dispose of it in large lots at ruling figures as ong as there remains a chance to sell it in small lots at better figures.

Wisconsin, Ohio, and state of the '79 crop are to be obtained in limited quantities only, and consist mostly of inferior grades.

Connecticut of the '79 crop, of which there is still a large stock on hand, moves very slowly. Large manufacturers continue to shun it, jobbers want to buy it at atmost binder figures, and the occasional sale of small parcels to small manufacturers is not conducive to the creating of a stir anywhere. Therefore, unlesses the '79 Pennsylvania leaves the market very soon, '79 Connecticut will have a poor show.

Export is almost extinct, owing to the supposed certainty of the establishment of a monopoly in Germany.

In regard to the '80 crops, little or nothing new is to be reported. There are the customary annual market whispers regarding dry rot in the Connecticut, wet rot in the state, white veins in the Pennsylvania and gummy fattiness in the Ohio and sin. seed, 18 cents. Havana-Market remains quiet. Sales, 600 bales, mostly '79, at former figures. One sale of 120 bales of '80, to a large manufacturer, is also reported. A Cigar Mystery.

Something mysterious is going on in the eigar trade. Manufacturers complain that business is bad, and that it has been very dull since the first of January. Box makers also have the same complaint to make. Nevertheless it appears that in this city tax was paid on 57,457,833 cigars last month, an increase of 7,747,658 as compared with February, and of 5,228,838 as compared with March, 1880.

Now the first question that strikes any one who is familiar with the industry is, ess is so had why has tax beet paid on such a large quantity of cigars?" Surely capital can be more profitably employed than by investing it in internal ELY'S CREAM BALM, revenue stamps. No manufacturer, it seems to us, will purchase stamps until he is in immediate need of them. What then is the solution of this mystery as we may fitly term it? There is no doubt that the cigar business is at a standstill. We are assured of it by manufacturers here, as well as by those in nearly all parts of the United States. There is only one way in which to account for the payment of such a heavy tax—that old orders are being filled. And yet it seems strange that there should be so many unfilled orders on hand as to require the outlay in one month of \$344,747 for tax. We cannot, however, account for it any other way.

If over fifty-seven million cigars had been manufactured last month and tax had been paid on them, it would not be at all puzzling, for then we should take it for granted that manufacturers were laying in big stocks in order not to be embarrassed should a general strike take place. But that, with business in such a dull condi-tion, tax should be paid on over fifty-seven million cigars-well, we confess it is a mystery we can't satisfactorily solve.

Cuba and Key West Leaf.

The latest communications from the island of Cuba seem to confirm the reports that high prices are being paid in the growing districts for the new crop. In the San Luis district the prices paid are: For from firsts to sevenths, \$5; eighths, \$3; ninths, \$2; tenths, \$1; elevenths to twelfths and Capadura, 34 reals per carat.

The cigarmakers employed in a number of factories in Key West struck about ten days since in consequence of the manufac-turers paying them their wages in scrip or orders, which they were forbidden to ac-cept by a regulation of their Union. For a time considerable excitement prevailed and it is reported that a cigarmaker was killed. There were several arrests made. Among those who were arrested on suspicion was Mr. Marara, a manufacturer. He gave bail and was released and afterwards exonerated from all blame by the court. Several cigarmakers are still lay-ing in jail awaiting trial. The principal officers of the Union are reported to have left Key West and the Union has been dis-

The Philadelphia Market. Handlers of cigar leaf claim a fair busi-ness, with demand largely beyond the supply of stock in store which at this time is required by the manufacturers; in other words, old leaf is scarce and difficult to obtain at a price at which it can be resold at a fair margin. This is particularly the case with old Penusylvania. Prospects are reported favorable and encouraging, but packers must not pay too high a price for new leaf, as cigars will only bring a certain price; do not kill the goose that lays the golden egg.
