RAILROAD WRECK.

Accident to a Freight and a Passenger New York, April 13.—The long freight train which left Jersey City on the Penn-sylvania railroad last night at 9:30 o'clock swept around the curve in the Bergen Cut with such force that the two rear cars were thrown directly across the down track on which trains coming to New

York run. The spot where the cars were wrecked is now a deep cut and the trains usually slack up in running through. When the engineer of the train from Newark entered the cut he saw the wrecked cars only a few hundred feet before him. He whistled and applied the patent air brakes, but to no effect, for in a moment later the train went crashing into the freight ears. The two freight cars were completely wrecked. The engine was thrown from the track against the rocky side wall. The baggage car and the first passenger car were also wrecked thrown over, and every window in the train was shattered. He Tells What Money He has Collected. In answer to the call of the Legislature upon him the attorney general says : OFFICE OF THE ATTORNET GENERAL HARRISBURG, April 12, 1881.

To the House of Representatives : GENTLEMEN: On the 6th of April I received notice of a resolution passed by your honorable body requesting me to report a detailed statement of claims due the commonwealth in my hands for cellection for the year 1879 and 1880, and also a detailed statement of the amount collected, showing the amount collected on each claim and the amount paid into the treasury : also, a detailed statement of the commissions collected, showing the amount of commissions collected and Wheat...... the amount paid into the treasury, as well as the amount retained by the attorney general within that period. I herewith wheat where the within the state of the whole wheat which wheat which which wheat which wh transmit the information requested in the form of detailed statements of the "claims" placed in my hands, to which I have added a statement of cases pending on appeal, with a copy of my quarterly reports to the state treasurer and annua settlements with the auditor general, showing in detail the sums collected and paid in and upon what account; also a detailed statement of commissions col lected, retained and paid into the treasury each year. This report may be briefly

summarized as follows:

the year 1881 was attained January 20,

collected have been paid into the state treasury from time to time-viz : \$238,98 and will be paid in hereafter until the annual settlement in October. Amounts have been paid into the treasury by instalments on claims which are not yet paid in fall and on which no commission will be full and on which no commission will be

deducted till final payment.

I may be permitted to remark that the commission of five per cent. allowed the attorney general is imposed as a penalty on delinquent taxpayers in addition to the amount of the tax due the commonweath. In no case does the attorney general receive any part of the money due the commonwealth for taxes as commission. Every question raised by the numerous pending appeals has been argued and submitted to the courts on test cases for decision with one exception, which was occasioned by the death of counsel. Many have been decided, others are still in the hands of the court, and others are pending on appeal to the supreme court of the state and the United States. I hold the receipt of the state treasurer, countersigned by the auditor general, for all sums of money collected by me belonging to the statemy practice being to pay over all money as soon as collected. My quarterly state-ments have been filed with the state treasurer and my annual settlements with the auditor general on the days and times appointed by law. My report made to the General Assembly at the beginning of the session, is in strict accordance with the act of Assembly and the precedents set by predecessors in office. Respectfully sub-
