PHILADELPHIA, April 27 .- In the United Strtes circuit court this morning Judges McKennan and Butler made the following decree restraining the issue of the blanket mortgage bonds by the Philadelphia & Reading railroad company.

"And now, on the 27th day of April, 1881 it is ordered, adjudged and decreed, that until the final hearing of this case, or until further order of the court, the defendant corporation and the other defendants, and each of them, be, and they hereby are, enjoined from executing this mortgage upon the property of the company for \$150,000,000 as mentioned in the bill, and from issuing any bonds or obligations secured by such mortgages upon the property of the company, and from doing any act towards the carrying out of the scheme of an issue of bonds or obligations as a part of an issue or issues amounting in the aggregate to \$150,000,-000, to be secured by a new mortgage as set forth in the bill and the exhibits there-

to attached. Judge McKennan informed counsel for F. B. Gowen that the decree did not deprive him of the right to present any new plan to the court for financial reorganization of the company.
