## A Binging Appent for "the Cardinal Doo-trines."

At the late meeting of the Democratic county committee of York county the chairman, A. F. Geesy, after complimenting and congratulating the committee upon the noble work accomplished by the Demacracy of York county, in the late presi-dential campaign, added the following address :

"There remains one other matter to which I desire to call your attention. The ordinary organization of the Democratic party is equal to the demands of ordinary times. But these are not times. Four years ago ordinary the will of the people was overcome by fraud and force, and the presidentelect was not allowed to take his seat. Last year, by the unscrupulous use of the vast patronage of the government, thus fraudulently retained, and by open intimidation and corruption of votors, together with an immeuse array of great corporations and monopolies against the people another victory was achieved by the party in power. The purpose of that party, no longer disguised, is revolution-the consolidation of all powers in the federal government, at the expense of the states and the people-those powers to be exercised by the few and for their own berefit gainst the many. This is what they 'strong government,' the 'system call of Hamilton,' which they insist must supersede the system of Jefferson upon which our free institutions were founded, and have now subsisted for a hundred years. "How is this revolution to be met? It was attempted on a smaller scale, while the patriots of '76 were still alive, to meet and rebuke it. The same classes, the same influences-that is to say, the great traders, the suddenly enriched speculators, the owners of the national debt uniting with Hamilton's national bank, the treasury and the officeholders-determined to override the states and establish a 'strong government' in the room of the young republic. That effort culminated in the latter part of John Adams' administration, in the infamous alien laws. sedition laws, commercial restrictionseration suffers-and in the shameless struggle, not unlike that which recently proved successful, to seat a president against the expressed will of the people in 1801. How did the Republicans of that day face and avert the first grand conspiracy to destroy the republic ? By the establishment, wherever possible, of what were called 'Democratic societies,' in which the people met, discussed the designs of their cnemies, contrived the means of defeating them, encouraged each other in the good fight for liberty, and directed and concen-trated public opinion so as to make it most effectual. These societies were mighty engines in the politics of that gloomy period. Their influence was widespread and irresistible. They spoke the voice of the people and made it respected. The result was the complete overthrow of the Federal party ; the sullen abandon-ment of the dark schemes of the 'monocrats ;' the election of Jefferson, and the putting of the 'ship of state on her Re-publican track again.' They 'saved the constitution,'-to use the expression of Jefferson-' at the last gasp.' "Will not the same means be equally effective now? There can be no doubt of it. Imagine Jefferson Democratic associations established at convenient points in every district, wherein intelligent Democrats might meet to discuss the affairs of the country, to expose to each other the dangerous character of the measures with which we are threatened, and to notify by resolution, by address, or by deputies, to their fellow Democrats and to the public, their opinions and their will! What power of perverted government, of patronage, of monopoly, of corruption, however, combined or manœuvred by greed and ambition, could withstand the thunders of the popular clubs ! "Again: It is beyond measure import-ant that the Democratic party, being the party of the people, should be managed by the people, and not by professional politi-cians and bosses, as the so-called Republi-can party is managed. These associations would afford a ready, convenient and regular method of expressing the people's regular method of expressing the people's wishes with regard to party concerns, local, state and national ; but without displacing any part of the usual and necessary machinery. "And again: The body of doctrine taught by Thoms Jefferson and his compatriots constitute the principles of the Democratic party. In rigid adherence to them, and steadfast opposition to every other system, by whatever delusive name it may be called, lies not only the public safety, but the salvation of the Democratic party. If there have been new departures from these, let us abandon them. If we have wandered in any particular from the faith of our fathers, let us return to it. If the organization of the great party, devoted to the defence of popular rights, has become enfeedled, by divisions arising from modern errors let us promptly correct the errors and so heal the divisions. the Democratic voters, they need not be expensive or burdensome in any way. Their meetings would be regulated by the desires of the members or the exigencies of public affairs, but the organization, once established, would be there and available for any emergency, like the vigilance committees of the Revolution, and the 'Democratic Societies,' which contributed so much to save the constitution in 1800, dissolved the Federalist conspiracy of that day, and gave us the glorious Democratic-Republican administrations Jefferson, Madison, Monroe and Jackson. "This, then, is no new thing under the sun. It was the plan of action adopted by the illustrious founders of the Demo-

cratic party to meet dangers almost pre-cisely similar to those which confront us. It has the hearty approval and recommen-dation of such leaders of this day as Samuel J. Tilden, Winfield Scott Hancock, Samuel, J. Randall and William A. Wallace. With the weight of these names and many others I might mention, in its favor, I need hardly say that in now bringing it to your attention, I am moved only by a profound sense of duty as the chairman of this committee. I offer the following resolution : " Resolved, That this committee recom-

mends the formation of Jefferson Democratic associations wherever practicable within the limits of this county ; and that each member of the committee will contribute his best endeavors toward the establishment of an association or associa. tions by his constituents." All of which was unanimously adopted and ordered to be published.






