Arnold: Sun (1), Washington, American (1), Humane-3. Mr. Hollinger was now dropped from the list of nominees.

FOURTH BALLOT. Franciscus: Friendship, Shiftler-2. Arnold: Sun, Washington, American, Humane, Empire-5.

Mr. Arnold was declared elected. Mr. P. S. Goodman, from the Shiffler, who voted for the opposing candidate moved to make the election unanimous. Mr. Daniel Trewitz, jr., of the Friendship, who also voted for the opposing candidate, seconded the motion. Mr. Arnold was accordingly made the unanimous choice of the union, and the president and secretary were instructed to notify the joint convention on Monday evening of the action of the union. and recommend to them the election of Assistant Engineer Arnold to the position of chief engineer of the fire department.

Mr. Flick named Mr. William Anderson, of the Shiffler. Mr. Trewitz declined the nomination. An election was ordered with the fol-

Empire-2. Anderson: Friendship, American (1) Humane, Shiffler, 31.

Mr. Shroad was dropped from the list of nominees.

Humane, Shiffler-31.

A Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth ballot were taken with a like result. On motion of Mr. Fellenbaum the election was declared a draw, and the whole matter left in the hands of the joint convention on Monday evening. The motion was amended by Mr. Gable, that neither of the candidates voted for in the union

be presented. Agreed to. The secretary called the attention of the members to the regular monthly meeting of the Union on next Tuesday evening the 10th inst., when the city councils' refusal to increase the amount of annual appropriation will be considered.

Meeting then adjourned. After the adjournment it was discovered that the city ordinance calls for an assistant from the companies north of King street, and one from those south of King. This would have rendered Mr. Howell ineligible had it been known. Mr Anderson is therefore free from the restrictive resolution of the union, and in all prob ability his name will be presented this evening to the joint committee.
