The Peach Borer.

Those who are willing to go to a little trouble to save their peach and plum trees from the borers should now at once attend to it. If the trees already have borers in them they must be taken out, which can best be done with the pointed blade of a pocket knife. First dig away the earth from the stem of the trees down to the roots, or about three or four inches. Then take out every borer. Then take a strip of muslin or other cloth and wind it tight around the tree from the roots up about six to eight inches above the ground and fasten well with tying twine or other string. A narrow strip two or three inches wide, wrapped around the tree spirally from below upwards, wound close and well lapped so as to cover every part of the bark, does very well. Then, when this is done, work the ground up and around the tree again and pack tightly against the stem so as to leave the wrapped part of the area three or four inches under ground This will last all summer and it is the only sure remedy against the borer.
