NEW YORK TRAGEDIES. A Woman SABBED BY HER HUSBAND—A Fatal Victim. New York, May 11.—John McCabe, ice cartman, of 427 West 16th street, who stabbed his wife nearly to death last night, and then attempted to drown himself, was arraigned in court to-day and held to await the result of the injuries he inflicted on his wife. She lies in a critical condition at the hospital.

The coroner went to the hospital yesterday to take the ante-mortem statement of Jas. Donnelly, but the man was unconscious when he reached there, and no statement could be given. Donnelly died last night. It was learned this morning that Donnelly was beaten by a woman on the 3d inst., and the police are looking for his assailant.

The Telegraph Consolidation. New York, May 11.—Council this morning in the suit of Rufus Hatch against the consolidated telegraph companies agreed upon an order containing the injunction previously granted, and which was based on the opinion of Judge Spear, which was published on Monday last. It restains the Western Union company from distributing the proposed increase of \$15,000,000 capital stock.
