An Interesting Decision

The supreme court has recently rendered a decision in an appeal from Montgomery county, of peculiar interest. William M. Bainbridge, a resident of Norristown, made a will in June, 1869, in which he disposed of all his property to the amount of about four hundred dollars. He directed that it should be invested and the income paid to his mother during her life. At her death, he directed that after all expenses were paid and legacies of twenty-five dollars to two nephews and one hundred dollars each to the Norristown encampment No. 37, I. O. O. F., and to Curtis lodge No. 239, I. O. O. F., all the rest of his estate should be used by the executor, Mr. Geo. W. Calhoun, in the erection of a monument over his grave at the death of his mother. The surviving brothers and sisters contested his right to use all the funds but contended that clause in the will, reading "such a monument as the amount of funds in his hands will warrant," require him to erect one in proportion to the amount of the estate and that he shoul not use all the rest, residue and remain der, as the testator at first directed Judge Ross in a lengthy opinion decided however, that the whole amount should b used in the erection of a monument. The case was taken to the supreme court with Theo. W. Bean, esq., for the executor, and George W. Rogers, esq., for the heirs, and the decision of the lower court was sustained, Justice Mercur delivering the opinion, C. J. Sharswood dissenting. The monument, which will be of white marble, sixteen feet high, will shortly be erected over his grave in the Montgomery cemetery, where he was buried in 1872. This is thought to be the first instance of the contest of a will upon such reasons as fermed the groundwork of this case.

Westminster Presbytery. At the adjourned meeting of this pres-bytery in the Pequea church on Tuesday Revs. Galbraith, Heany, Cairnes, Crawford, Stewart and Hume, were appointed supplies for the Little Britain pulpit, va-cated by the resignation of Rev. Michael; Revs. Crawford and Gamble and Elder Linville were made a committee to visit the congregation; Revs. Niles and Heany and Elder D. E. Small were appointed delegates to the National temperance convention at Saratoga. Mr. T. Davis Richards, a member of York Presbyterian church, was received

under care of presbytery and recommended to the advantages of the Coleman scholarship fund of the collegiate institute. Mr. Chas. L. Cooder, having sustained his examinations was ordained to the holy ministry, Rev. James Moffat, D. D., of the presbytery of New Brunswick, and professor of ecclesiastical history in Princeton theological seminary, preaching the sermon; Dr. Stewart charged the pastor and Rev. Ledwith the people. Presbytery adjourned to meet in the Chanceford church, York county, September 12,
