Coroner Mishler held an inquest on the remains. The jury was composed of Officer William Titus, Reah F. Wilson, Jacob Frankford, C. S. Pickel, John A. Schuh and Michael Snyder. They rendered the following verdict : "That the woman came to her death from privation and neglect, having suffered from some unknown disease, and the jury recommed the coroner to remove the body, at once and that the house be cleaned and renovated, and the family of the deceased removed." After the inquest the body was loaded on a wagon and was hauled to the almshouse where it was buried. The house where the woman died was in a filthy condition, and the smell in it was very offensive. The board of nealth have given orders to have the house thoroughly cleaned and the persons living in it must be removed. The terrible condition of the house, which is occupied by four families, may have had much to do with

the woman's death. The deceased woman was 50 years of age. Her name was Margaret Bailing and she leaves a husband and one child.

A warrant was issued Tuesday for the arrest of the assassins, and Sheriff Walters with a posse started in pursuit and overtook them at Buyer's store, five miles south of Sikeston. They fied to the woods and secreted themselves behind a fallen tree and fired upon the posse, killing Robt. La Farge. The sheriff's party returned the fire, but receiving a second volley retired The desperadoes then robbed the dead body of La Farge and fled. In the evening Pat Rhodes, one of the gang, who had been wounded by the sheriff's posse, came and gave himself up. This morning a party of villagers took him out and hanged him and hundreds of men are scouring him, and hundreds of men are scouring the country in every direction for the remainder of the party.
