

---American Humor.

A recent issue of the Berlin Tageblatt illustrates the oft-asserted fact that some forms of American humor are not readily comprehended in Europe. A writer in the German paper came across one of the sensational announcements of the "Salva tion Army," as follows :

"War against Satan is declared in Hoboken, and begins on Sunday, September 12th, 1880, at 75 Newark street. The first shot will be fired at 8 o'clock in the morning, beginning with a service of prayer. Shooting will be kept up all day, with short interruptions, etc., etc."

In America an announcement like this is taken figuratively. No one attends the revival exercises with an impression that guns and pistols constitute the weapons of offensive warfare against the enemy of mankind. But the matter-of-fact German writer construed shooting to mean shooting. He did not understand the American processs of shooting at sin. He not disposed to be severe in his comments, but attributes the character of our religious assaults to centain uncontrollable national impulses. He proceeds as follows to enlighten the German mind as to the nature of these services.

" The American is fond of shooting. It is great sport for him to use his revolver 137 North Queen street. on all testival occasions, and in the cities, on the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, many persons are shot who have the misfortune to stand in the way of these joyful salutes. We also know that Sunday is observed in America with puritanical severity, and that all the joy-ous amusements indulged in by us inhab-itants of the old world are. forbidden in the United States. But the people will be amused, and since the Americans are happiest when they are shooting, the intelligent Yankees hit upon the uncommonly sly idea to unite a religious service with the pleasures of the shooting rauge. Shooting on Sunday is a great sin, but, if Satan serves as the target, it is a solemn duty. So the public amuses itself and has a devil of a time, without breaking the Sunday law, which it circanvents with such pleasure."


The point of the German writer's comments is still further blunted by the fact that the "Salvation Army" is an English institution, and the peculiar phraseology of the announcement was adopted in England. It must be admitted, however, that there is a strong suspicion that it was the work of some American who happened to be in London at the time.

Aneclotes of Animals.
