"THE END OF THE WORLD." STARTLING EFFECT OF CONKLING'S WRATH.

The Story of the True Condition of the Capital That was Suppressed. The following graphic account of start ling events at Washington Monday, sent to the Cincinnati Gazette, seems to have been suppressed to this section, probably by Mr. Blaine. General Boynton says: The cry, "Conkling has resigned," spread through the buildings, and from

the committee rooms, restaurants, rotunda, supreme court room, library and House wing, attendants, judges, senators, office-scekers, lobbyists, visitors and workmen, a great crowd poured out into the parks, each fleeing from the conviction in every mind that such a dire event must be followed by an earthquake. With the fight rose cries, "The dome is falling!" "The Senate columns "The dome is are swaying!" "The House wing is settling!" "Out for your lives!" In half an hour the extras were spreading the news throughout the town. As the cry "Conkling has resigned" went up and down the streets the same impulse which cleared the capitol caused men, women and children to swarm into the streets and parks. The sick, too, were brought out, and in the short space of two hours the public grounds of Washington were like those of Chicago on the night of the great fire. Families were crowded in group, shelter-ing themselves as best they might, guarding the effects they were able to suatch in their flight, and many of them earing for and comforting the sick who had been rescued from the impending earthquake. But even dread of the earthquake gave

way to an added anticipation of the hour. The cry spread that Conkling would surely stop the earth's turning; that he was the exle, and he knew it, and his anger was such that he would never be satisfied with a paltry earthquake. Not he! And so men, especially the New Yorkers, began to lash themselves to trees, and iron posts, and fences, so that if the earth did stop turning east, they, at least, would not spin off eastward into the Atlantic. Those who know Conkling best, in addition to lashing themselves fast, put on life preservers, for, as they explained, Coukling might stop the earth with such a jerk that no lashings would hold, and they might be hurled into the ocean in spite of ropes or

President Garfield has left the White House and is camped in the yard of his private residence on the corner of Thirteenth and I streets. He will not enter it until after the earthquake, and until the earth has stopped turning and settled down to work again, according to Mr. Conkling's directions. General Garfield recognizes the fact that the republic is toppling to its downfall. Everybody seemed instinctively to know there would be nothing less than an earthquake. The president only stopped to gather up his family and a little bedding and cold meat, and having secured these he drove hastily to his private residence and camped in the vard as before.

"Therefore, it is meet that all good citizens, abandoning their usual pleasure and labors, should assemble without delay in the camps, and all other public places where they have taken refuge from the impending catastrophe of nature, and sup-plicate this mighty Coukling that he will allay his anger and spare his children and allow the land to resume its prosperity. JAMES A. GARFIELD.

By the President, JAMES G. BLAINE, Secretary of State. The signal service bureau sent out the

following:
"Ordered—That danger signals be displayed at all coast stations of the United States, and that masters of vessels in every port be warned that this office expects tidal waves and tornadoes for at least a month to come. Observers should carefully watch and correct their instruments. Those in this office are badly paralyzed, and the explanation must be found in the expected earthquake which must follow the Conkling resignation."

The secretary of the treasury has rescinded his circular for refunding the 5s. He says: .

"The unexpected blow which has been inflicted upon the United States by the resignation of the mighty Mr. Conkling must, of necessity, sink its credit to a low ebb, if it does not destroy it altogether. The secretary is, therefore, unwilling to urge his fellow-citizens to ask that their bonds be extended at the rate hamed in his last circular, and it is, therefore, sus-pended until the full measure of the pun-ishment which Mr. Coukling intends to in flict upon this country and the world shall become known."

The secretary of state has telegraphed to all ministers of the late government as follows:

"You will at once inform the nations to which you are accredited that Roscoe Conkling, of New York, has blotted out the American republic, and that he will in due time announce the kind of monarchical government which it may suit his lordship to establish. To you, privately, I may say, with due shamefulness, that "turkey gobbler strut" has won : that mud has become diamond; the satyr is now Hyperion; the New York singed cat is now a Bengal tiger.

" Yours respectfully,
" JAMES G. BLAINE. "Late secretary of state of the late American republic, out of a job." [LATER.]

The gracious and mighty Mr. Conkling, monarch of all he surveys, etc., etc., has sent his bugler, Platt, around to say that he has concluded not to have an earthquake or tidal wave or tornado; that he won't destroy the general prosperity of the na-tion, as he thought of doing, nor close the departments, nor shut up the courts; nor dissolve the Senate. And so people are beginning to move into their houses again, and the government is recalling its orders, and its proclamations, and has begun to draw its breath with regularity. If Lord Roscoe gets a good sleep all may move smoothly again, and the repub-

he usually prefers, though on grand occasions he drives a mail coach made after the approved model of the London coach-ing club. Those leather straps have been added by his family quite lately, and much against the old gentleman's will; but having not long since tumbled out of his place to the consternation of his attendants who picked him up none the worse for his fall, but very dusty, and in a state of towering indignation against everything and everybody, he has given a grudging assent to their wishes, naturally not desiring to literally "bite the dust" a second time. His fondness for notoriety must certainly be gratified, for the band wagon of Barnum's great moral show never excited more attention than does the Livingstone turnout. An hour ago he passed my window on his way to the Caschine, where he shows himself on most pleasant afternoons. His horses pranced and capered, and the great golden buckles

gleamed brightly in the sunshine. Two preternaturally solemn footmen, clad in blue liveries, sat with folded arms upon their perch, and the main scats of the drag were occupied simply by a small, black terrier pup, who amused himself by jumping backward and forward, vigorously barking at the crowd. Mr. Livingstone sit in solitary grandeur, strapped securely into the coachman's place, wrapped in an overcoat lined throughout with magnificent Russian sables The fur formed col-lar and green cuffs. A garment which a young American belle might well envy him. A retinue of thirty or forty ragged gamins escorted him, commenting on the points of the establishment and watching for stray confessimi, but the owner of all this magnificence sat rigidly upright, bis eyes fixed upon his frisky leaders, for although he is said to enjoy the plaudits of the admiring crowd, he is not given to any unnecessary expenditure of copper coins.
