### Farm and Garden.

Suggestions for the Summer Leisure. Germantown Telegraph. On the extensive seed-farm of Messrs Landreth & Sons not a chicken is to be found, but a large number of guinea-fowls are allowed the freedom of the grounds, which destroy insects of every kind and are considered invaluable in this respect.

The potato-beetles cross and recross rivers in their visitations. Many are seen in the Delaware, clinging to any support to carry them on their way. The other day while in the vicinity of Bridesburg, none were visible, but after starting for the New Jersey shore numbers were seen clinging to sticks floating in the river, and many were noticed on the opposite shore, although no apparent damage was done to the plants they usually infest.

The fate rains have had a remarkable effect upon the grass and grain crops. We think they have added to the grass yield about fifty per cent. of the promise only two weeks ago. The wheat has been also greatly benefited. Many thin places have been filled in; hence, while the wheat crop in this section will not be up to that of last year, it will still, most probably, be a pretty fair crop. The rye could not look better. We have not yet encoun-

tered a poor field.

The Fultz wheat, now so generally cultivated in many portions of the United States, was named after its discoverer, Abram Fultz, of Allenville, Mifflin county, Pa., and originated from three stalks which he found in a neighboring field and attracted his attention by their croct position, being different also in appearance from the fallen wheat which surrounded them. This is the way that so many valuable grains, seeds, plants, &c., originate. Of course only the single stool or plant must be taken.

There is every prospect that California will be a land of plenty during this year of grace. The crops are all in excellent condition, and the supply of fruit will be enormous unless some unforeseen disaster cuts it off untimely. In many localities the fruit buds were saved from injury by late frosts by keeping smouldering fires under the trees at night. The grape crop which increases largely from year to year, will not be seriously damaged by the phylloxera, though that pest has threatened to visit the California vineyards.

A very rapid cure of the foot-and-mouth disease in cattle is said to have been discovered by the Duke of Brunswick. He uses a solution of salicylic acid, prepared by pouring some hot water on about three tablespoonfuls of the acid in an earthen vessel, adding lukewarm water to make up a gallon. The mouth and feet of the diseased animal should be earefully washed three times a day with this liquid and the tops of the hoofs well powdered with the dry acid after each washing. To the drinking water should be added two tablespoonfuls of the acid dissolved in hot

Our information from the eastern counties of the state unites in the promise of an abundant crop of apples, pears, cherries, grapes, raspberries, &c. On our own contracted premises the prospect could not be more encouraging. The outdoor grapes never were so full of embryo fruit; in fact if they should generally mature at least one-half of them will have to be removed The same is the case with the pears. As to cherries, however, it is never known until they are taking on some color what the crop is going to be.

There are some people—among them good nurserymen—who doubt the value of mulching newly-planted trees, and offer excellent reasons for it. While we do not ... To pile around a young tree a mass of grass, weeds, manure, etc., and allow it to remain undisturbed through the whole or, the greater part of the hot, dry season, may be of no service, rather an injury to the young tree, as the fresh air is excluded from the soil and it becomes dry and hard. But this is not the way that we recommend mulching to be done. We recommend that the mulching should be removed four or five times during the season, give the earth around the tree a careful stirring, then water, if the soil needs it and apply fresh mulch. It is a good plan, also, after planting a tree in the spring, to give the soil around the stem a dish shape, in order that it may receive a good supply of rain. This mode being followed, our own experience satisfies us that mulching is an excellent thing, and for us has saved many a tree perishing from drought.

Value of Stirring the Soil. Germantown Telegraph.

Everyone knows that wet soil is a great injury to growing crops. And yet a regular supply of moisture in the soil during the season, is one of the most important objects to accomplish. If soil, especially wet soil, is left undisturbed, it soon becomes hard; technically it "bakes," and the mosture escapes with marvelous rapidity. It is therefore an object to keep the surface loose. Moisture does not escape as rapidly through a loose surface as through a compact solid one. In pursuit of this subject, however, cul-

tivators often make a great mistake, and much injury results to corn, potatoes and other things. The cultivator is kept running all summer, the teeth often penetrating several inches deep, exposing the up-turned surface to the sun, and in, this way a vast amount of moisture evaporates that is realy needed by the plants. It is of course much better than to have a baked surface; but there is loss for all, and loss that might be easily saved by a little

The first stirring in spring should be deep in order to break up the compact earth, especially if the ground was plowed in the fall; but after this the working should be as shallow as possible. Firm soil-soil crushed and pressed when dryholds moisture better than in any other condition, and is a very different thing to a merely loose soil through which the exter-nal air easily goes, and dries the moisture out. The more such partially-dried soil is pressed, the firmer therefore it becomes and the more moisture it contains. This is the principle on which the good effects of the roller depends, and which has been so often explained in the Telegraph. Rolling and pressing while the soil is somewhat dry is indeed the whole science of pulverization, the good effects of which are so well known.

While, therefore, the first stirring should be done with deep and narrow teeth, so as to penetrate as deeply as possible, all subsequent workings should be with cultivators having short and broad teeth, just skimming the surface and cutting off instead of tearing out the weeds; and this advice is as good for the one who uses the horse cultivator in the fields.

In any case the hoe should be started

early. Hoeing and cultivating has now become among the most laborious of farm and garden tasks; and if the work to keep them down. The best farmers do not wait for weed to appear, if they can possibly spare the time from other work; but put the cultivator through as soon as the first spring sun cakes a little the exposed earth. sprouting weeds are thus destroyed in the germ, and the work is comparatively easy all the season afterwards. Spring-work is generally so pressing that it is not often that one can be so forehanded in the mat ter of early weeding. Happy is the man

who can do it; but all should aim to get as near this happiness as possible.
