ALBANY, June 10.-The joint convention met at 12 m., with Senator Robertson in the chair, and proceeded to vote for a successor to Mr. Conkling, with the following result: Conkling 33, Wheeler 20, Cornell 15, Folger 2, Jacobs 47, Rogers 18, Lapham 6, Tremaine 5, Bradley 1, Harris 1.
