SKILES AND PRIDY.

Dilly-Dailying of the Com-The investigating committee of the Re-publican board of return judges of the late primary election met in Grant hall this morning at 10 o'clock. Present— Messrs. Frank Musselman, chairman, Strasburg; Sam'l Evans, secretary, Columbia; Jacob Halbach, Second ward, city; W. S. Burns, Seventh ward, city; J. P. Albright, East Doncgal; George A. Wallace, East Earl.

Mr. Halbach offered the following reso lutions, which were read and adopted

Resolved, That the president and vice president of the return board produce and deliver to this committee all returns, tally papers and poll books in their posses-

Resolved, That the judge of Lower, Mt. Joy township, Breneman's school house, be requested to produce before the committee the return, tally paper, poll book and tickets of the primary election held in that district at the next meeting of the committee, to beheld on Wednesday, June 15, at 101 o'clock.

As the above resolutions were adopted before Messrs. Albright and Wallace arrived, they were again read for their information.

Mr. Albright said that under the rules of the party and under all parliamentary rule, the functions of this committee had ceased. The committee had been created by the board of return judges and had been discharged by the board of return judges, and therefore had no more power to act for the Republican party thad any other seven members of the party.

Mr. Halbach held that at the time the committee is alleged to have been discharged there was not a quorum present; and even if the board had discharged the committee, it had no right to do so, as the rules of the party provide that the committee shall be reconvened on application of any twenty-five members of the party that such application had been made to two members of the committee; that these two members had convened the committee, and the meeting of the committee was entirely regular. Besides, there had been precedent set in this matter by the reconvening of the investigating committee last year.

Mr. Albright replied that last year the board of return judges did not discharge the return board were not present when this action was taken it was their own fault, as they ought to have been present He denied that this committee had any right, as a committee, to prosecute the investigation. They had been unmade by the authority that made them. He was not present because the chairman of the committee had issued his calls but came simply out of curiosity.

Mr. Burns moved that the committee

adjourn until half-past one o'clock p. m. Mr. Evans opposed the motion, and hoped the committee would remain in ses- clans in their practice, and by all civilized nasion until the arrival of counsel, who were attending a meeting of the Lancaster bar, which would soon adjourn.

Joy had or had not been reconsidered.

To settle all doubt the majority reconsidered it and Halbach wanted it readepted. J. Hay Brown, of Fridy's counsel, opposed the proposition of making a demand from a single district and wanted to go to the bottom of all the alleged rascalities. Halbach's resolution was not laid on the table, and the Lower Mt. Joy returns were called for by the votes of the four Skiles men on the committee. Vice President Henderson produced these and other returns, amid some excitement. Hay Brown wanted to know where he got them. Henderson said that they came into his custody properly at the meeting of the return

Brown said the Mt. Joy return had been surreptitiously taken from the meeting of the board of return judges, had been re-peatedly asked for and could not be found, and now it is brought here and produced to the very committee that asks the return judge of Lower Mount Joy to produce it. It is not in his possession, of course, and he cannot produce it. The passage of the resolution will amount to nothing. He hoped some member of the committee would ask to have included the Seventh ward, as he understood it had never been presented to the return judges. As the judge from that ward is a member of this committee, perhaps he can give some in-

formation on that subject.

Mr. Burns said he had handed in the returns from the Seventh ward, but did not know whether or not the poll book was with them. Mr. Hollinger could tell him all about it. It was resolved that the Seventh ward

be included in the resolution relative to the returns from Lower Mt. Joy. Friday next, June 17th, was fixed as the time for the next meeting of the committee.

On the contrary, he naturally receives it as an intimation that we rather like his ways.

THREE ACTS.

APPROVED BY THE GOVERNOR.

To Punish insurance Frauds, to Aboli Race Distinction in the Public Schools, and to Prohibit the The following important laws having a

local application, which were passed by the Legislature which has just adjourned

have received the signature of Governor Hoyt: To punish frauds upon life insurance companies by agents, physicians and

others. Section 1. That any agent of a mutual, stock, or co-operative life insurance com-pany or association, physician or other person whatsoever who shall knowingly make or be concerned or interested in making any misrepresentation or false statement for the purpose of securing from any mutual, stock or co operative life insurance company or association a policy of insurance or certificate of membership upon his own life, or the life of any other person, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof be fined not exceeding one thousand dollars, or undergo imprisonment not exceeding one year, or both, in the discretion of the court. Approved the 10th day of June, A.D. 1881. HENRY M. HOYT. A further supplement to the school laws

of this commonwealth and to abolish all distinction of race or color in the public schools thereof. Section 1. That hereafter it shall be un lawful for any school director, superinten-dent or teacher to make any distinction whatever on account of or by reason of

the race or color of any pupil or scholar

who may be in attendance upon or seeking

admission to any public or common school maintained wholly or in part under the school laws of this commonwealth. Section 2. That the twenty-fourth section of an act of Assembly approved the eighth day of May, A. D. 1854, entitled 'An act for the regulation and continuance of the system of education by common schools' -which section is as follows: That the directors or controllers of the several districts of the state are hereby authorized and required to establish within their respective districts separate schools for the tuition of negro and mulatto children whenever such separate schools can be so located as to accommodate twenty or more pupils, and whenever such separate schools shall be established and kept open four months in any year, the directors or controllers shall not be compelled to admit such pupils into any other school of the district: Provided, That in cities or boroughs the board of controllers shall provide for such schools out of the general funds assessed and collected by uniform taxation for educational pur

pealed. Section 3. This law shall take effect on the fourth day of July ensuing the passage thereof. Approved the eight day of June, A. D., 1881. HENRY M. HOYT. To prohibit the sale to any person under sixteen years of age of deadly weapons, gunpowder and explosive substances in

the commonwealth of Pennsylvania. That any person who shall knowingly and wilfully sell, or cause to be sold, to any person under sixteen years of age, any cannon, revolver, pistol or other such deadly weapon, or who shall knowingly and wilfully sell, or cause to be sold, to any such minor any imitation or toy cannon, revolver or pistol so made, constructed or arranged as to be capable of being loaded with gunpowder or other explosive substances, cartridges, shot slugs or balls and being exploded, fired off and dis-charged and thereby become a dangerous or deadly weapon, or who shall know-ingly and wilfully sell, or cause to be sold to any such minor any cartridge, gunpowder or other dangerous and explosive sub stance shall in every case be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be sentenced to pay a fine not ex-ceeding three hundred dollars. Approved the tenth day of June, A. D. 1881.
