Around here they draw a furrow, hoe a place for a hill, planting the plant on the level, a very good way so long as the weather is wet. For dry weather take the old fashioned way as they found out to be the best in Lancaster county; throw up a ridge, hoe it down and the plant will be surrounded with new soil. A new shed that we saw is closely patterned after the good ones in Lancaster county. Some time ago a Laucaster man who packed a thousand cases here told me that the tobacco under favorable cir-

After a short stop at Harrisburg we embarked on the Niagara express which hur ried us along through a wild, romantic country stopping for a few minutes at Dauphin. This vicinity is picturesque and seen often as one of the naturally prettiest places along the line of the Pennsylvania railroad. For twentyeight miles north of the terminus the Schuylkill & Susquehanna railroad there is not a village or school house. It is known as the "Wilderness of Pennsylvania." Think of a township in this stafe not having twenty-eight voters in it; and such a sparsly settled district can be found along this road. "Talk about your beautiful scenery in Europe," says a passenger formerly of that feountry, now of Sunbury, "anyone who goes along there sees scenery surpassing anything in that country.'

The railroad runs parallel to the Susque hanna for many a mile. It is a fine broad river, much deeper now than usual; in some parts it is wider than others; it is full of islands, covered with green trees; the banks for the most part are covered with trees. ANOTHER HITCH.

The Lamp Committee and the Gasolin Company Fail to Make Terms At the special meeting of city councils held on Friday evening of last week to consider the matter of lighting the city, the lamp committee were "instructed to enter into a contract with the Pennsylvania Globe gaslight company for lighting all the city lamps for the term of one year at the best possible terms."

Agreeably to this provision the committee met last evening for the purpose of closing the contract. The members were all present, and the chairman, Mr. Barr, presented a communication from Mr. C. K. Robinson, secretary and treasurer of the company, from which the following is extracted:

"I notice that you still have the im-pression that I offered to deduct \$1.50 per lamp from our bid in consideration of getting all the lamps. This is a mistake, as we bid for 185 or as many more as the council may direct, which was intended to cover all the lamps if necessary; and our figures were based on the possibility and almost probability of our getting the whole city.
This was the principal reason why I put
the price so low, which was really lower than it should have been as I explained in my letter to the committee. * * * * What I did say to you was, in advocating a change in the ordinance so as to permit the awarding the contract for more than one year, I said that it would be an advantage to the city and offered, in consideration of a three years contract, to deduct \$1.50 per lamp per year from our bid, either for the whole city or the 186 lamps which we are now lighting. I also said this in the presence of the mayor and to Mr. Geo. Zecher. This is the only offer to reduce our bid that I have made, and I hope the explaination will be satisfactory."
