Landlord Borrows Money and Leaves His Family. George Dennis, proprietor of the Washington house, Manheim, and formerly bartender at the Franklin house, this city, and of a hotel in Neffsville, appears to have absconded and taken with him considerable sums of other people's money. He left his home in Manheim on Friday and drove to Lancaster with a horse and carriage. He made several purchases in this city, among them being a trunk from Edw. Schaester, a suit of clothes from Al. Rosenstein, for which he gave him a check for \$25, payable on Monday. He bought a hat from Shultz & Brc. and tendered in payment a check for \$12, receiving the balance in cash. He sold his horse and carriage for \$140, and stated to some of his friends that he was going to California, though he asked Mr. Schaeffer to purchase him a ticket for Baltimore. On Saturday he left this city for parts un-

known. Since he left, it has been ascertained that he induced Mr. Hershey of New Haven to indorse a note for him for \$1,000, and Dr. Bowman of Neffsville to indorse another for \$500, on both of which he drew the money. It is also stated that he borrowed money from quite a number of his country friends, promising to repay them on Monday. By these means he gathered together quite a sum of money and is said to have had between \$1,800 and \$2,000 in hand when he left this city. His father-in-law, George Shreiner, a man of high repute and large means set him up in business in Mauheim, but Dennis being addicted to drink, spent more money than be made, and is said to have left behind him lebts amounting to about \$4,000. He is about 25 years old, below the medium height, light complexioned with light hair and moustache, and had on when he left a light suit of clothes. ## Two More Reversals.

Judge Trunkey yesterday delivered opinion of the supreme court reversing the judgment of the court in this county in the cases of the Commonwealth Mutual insurance company vs. Frank Huntzinger, on the ground that written notice of additional insurance was not given to the secretary as required by the policy, nor was the waiver of such notice by the company shown. Burkholder vs. Markley was also reversed in an opinion delivered by the same judge, because all of the offers of testimony set forth in the assignment of error should have been admitted by the court below.

LIGHTING THE CITY.

The Globe Company Gets the Contract Chas, C. Yeaton, agent of the Automat e gaslight company, of New York, ar rived in this city last evening, in compliance with a request of A. R. Barr, esq., chairman of the lamp committee, who some days ago visited New York for the pupose of seeing the operation of the Automatic lamp and comparing its merits with those of the Pennsylvania Globe lamp, of Philadelphia, which the city councils have substituted for the street gas lamps. Mr. Yeaton brought with him one of the Automatic lamps, and before an informal gathering of the lamp committee and councilmen not members of the com mittee, exhibited it in the council chamher, where a free expression of opinion was indulged. Mr. Yeaton was present and explained its work-

ings for the information of the councilmen. Mr. Robinson, the representative of the Globe company, was also present. It may be remarked that the original bid of the Automatic company was \$21 per lamp per annum, whilst that of the Globe company was \$24.50. Councils nevertheless. in view of the known merits of the Globe lamp, directed the lamp committee to enter into a contract with that company 'on the best possible terms," as has already appeared in these columns, Mr. Robinson reduced his bid to \$23.50, but the committee held off for \$23, to which that gentleman was loth to accede, and so the contract hung fire. Saturday evening, however, Mr. Robinson was in the city ready to close the agreement at the terms demanded by the committee. A quorum could not be got together, however, and again the closing of the bar-gain was deferred. Meanwhile, Chairman Barr, having seen the virtues of the Automatic lamp, was endeavoring to impress upon his colleagues of the committee the propriety of contracting with that company, claiming that it would be a saving of the matter of \$1,000 to the city, and at the same time provide a much handsomer and more ornamental lamp than the Globe coneern, with which councils had ordered the contract to be made, and as above stated

The committee met at 1 o'clock this afternoon in the full light of an Automat's lamp, which burned brilliantly upon the president's desk in common council chamber. All the members of the committee—Messrs. Smeych, White. Philip Zecher and Barr, chairman—were present, and Messrs. Robinson and Yeaton, representatives of the rival bidders, were also upon the floor. Without ado, Mr. White moved that the contract be given to the Globe company at \$23 per lamp per annum, stating that he understood Mr. Robinson was willing to contract at that price. The chairman's suggestion that Mr. Yeaton ought to be given another chance to explain the merits of his lamp elicited from Mr. Smeych a motion that he be heard. A second was not heard. and Mr. White insisted upon his motion being put, and it was agreed to, Messrs. White and Zecher voting aye, Mr. Barr no, and Mr. Smeych not voting.
