Receipt for Making Currant Wine. The currants should be, fully ripe when picked; put them into a large tub, in which they should remain a day or two, then crush with the hands, unless you have a small patent wine press in which they should not be pressed too much, or the stems will be bruised and impart a disagreeable taste to the juice. If the hands are used, put the crushed fruit after the juice has been poured off, in a cloth or sack and press out the juice. Put the juice back into the tub after removing any stems, skins or seeds remain ing, where it should be left about three days, until the first stage of fermentation is over, and removing once or twice a day the scum copiously arising to the top. Then before putting the juice in a vessela demijohn, keg or barrel-any size to suit the quantity made :

To each quart of juice add Three pounds of the best yellow sugar, And soft water sufficient to make a gal

Thus, ten quarts of juice and thirty pounds of sugar will give you ten gallons of wine, and so on in that proportion.

Those who do not like sweet wine can reduce the quantity of sugar to 21; or who wish it very sweet, raise it to 31 pounds per

The vessel must be full, and the bung or stopper left off until fermentation ceases which will be in twelve or tifteen days, meanwhile the cask must be filled up daily with currant juice left over, as fermentation throws off the impure matter. When fermentation ceases rack the wine off carefully, either from the spigot or by the syphon, and keep running all the time. Cleanse the cask thoroughly with boiling water, then return the wine, bung up tightly and let stand four or five months, when it will be fit to drink, and can be bottled if desired.

All these vessels, casks, &c., should be perfectly sweet, and the whole operation should be done with an eye to cleanliness In such event, every drop of brandy or other spirituous liquor added will do tract from the flavor of the wine, and will not in the least degree increase its keeping qualities. Current wine made in this way will keep for an age.

Summer Grape-Pruning. Germantown Telegraph.

About this, as in nearly every other horticultural subject, there is a considerable difference of opinion. We have known vines to be "pruned to death" in following out some wild theory that some addleheaded fellow had started, while others would prune so sparingly as to be of no benefit at all. Many strip the vines of three-fourths their leaves to allow the sun and air to get in, as they say, while others allow the grapes to be smothered for want of a judicious removal of the leaves. Pinching the ends off the vines, or clipping off a portion of the sprouts when they are growing rampantly, so far as it appears to be necessary to any reasonable judgment, will greatly benefit the crop, just as the reverse will damage it. The thinning out of the surplus banches, by removing from a third to a half of them as they usually show them-selves, is of the greatest importance. In doing this be sure always to The laterals of the fruit-bearing branches which have been pinched or clipped, will throw out more branches, and these also should be pinched so as to leave only a single leaf. The laterals on the canes, remember, are to be the fruit-bearing canes for next year, and should be allowed to grow unchecked. Care must be taken to tie up such af the branches containing bunches which are too heavy to bear their own weight. There should, also, be no more wood allowed to grow than is needed for the following year's fruiting.

These simple general hints may be of service to those whose knowledge of grape growing is limited. In a little while-a few years of experience, which can be greatly aided by examining the way that good grape growers follow-will soon put one in the plain road to success.

Drying Cherries.

Cherries intended to be dried must first be stoned, spread on flat dishes and dry them in the sun or warm oven; pour whatever juice runs from them over them, a little at a time; stir them about that they may dry evenly. A Triangular Campaign. Additional interest will be imparted the coming political campaign in Virginia by the action of the Republican state cen-tral committee at Richmond yesterday, which, by an almost unanimous vote, determined to hold a convention on the 24th of August to nominate a full straight Republican state ticket. This precipitates a triangular contest in Virginia, as the Readjusters have already placed their ticket in the field, and the Democrats are now engaged in choosing delegates to their nominating convention, which meets at Richmond on the 4th of August. Col. Cameron the Readjuster nominee for governor, pro-poses to open the canvass in the valley early in August, whilst Mr. John S. Wise, another prominent Readjuster, will commence a canvass of the tide-water counties, beginning with Accomac next week. Although the regular Democratic organiza-tion deemed it expedient to postpone their convention until the first of August, and consequently an active prosecution of the campaign until a little later, the leaders are not idle, but are quietly and effectively organizing their forces, having learned these tactics from the Readjuster leader. Gen. Mahone. All of the prominent Republican leader: in the state except United States Marshal John F. Lewis (Who is the Readjuster nominee for lieutenant governor,) seem to be out-spoken in behalf of a straightout ticket, and under the leadership of General Wickham, Congressmen Dezendorf and Jorgenson, Major Yost, of the Staunton Virginian, Capt. John F. Wilson, postmaster at Lyuchburg, and others, the Republicans will doubtless present a compact force, leaving Gen. Mahone to recruit his supporters, with the exception of a few stragglers here and there, from the Democratic ranks. What success is promised him in this direction it is perhaps too early to judge, but if the recent local elections in Virginia, where almost every Readjuster nominee for the clerkships was defeated, can be taken as an indication, it would seem that Gen. Mahone has quite as hard a task before him as he had when he attempted to throw the election of officers of the United States senate into the hands of

the Republicans—an effort in which he ignominiously failed.
