A tobacco grower, writing from Red Oak, Brown county (the Ohio White Burley district) says: As we are approaching another season in which the farmers are making an effort to produce an increased acreage of tobacco in this county, having had several years experience in cultivating and handling the weed-by your permission, I will offer a few suggestions, as to the mistakes that a great many farmers make, in cultivating and handling same. There has been so much said and written on tobacco culture, and each one has a theory of his own differing from every one else, I shall only touch two or three points which I consider to be the most im-1. We cultivate too many acres. In to-

bacco, as in other crops, we should learn how to make it pay best with the least amount of labor and destruction of soil. We plant double the number of acres the labor is capable of producing, the result is that a great portion of the crop is next to worthless. As the supply and demand fixes the price to a great extent, it is very important to produce an article to meet the demand, and a good article always finds a ready market. Now how are we to get a good article of tobacco is the important question. Suppose instead of eight acres, we plant four acres of the best sectionthen we have the advantage of the soil to start with; next put most of the labor intended for eight acres on the four, to work neatly and thoroughly, be on time and you will find plenty of time to breathe freely once in a while, and not always in a fret, and by times completely swamped.

2. We mistake in topping too high: four out of five top from three to five leaves too high. Low topping produces larger leaves, more body and firmnes more weight and takes less labor, and ripens earlier, thereby escaping frost.

3. The larger portion of our farmers cut and house their tobacco before it is thoroughly matured; tobacco should stand six or seven weeks after topping, unless injured by spots. A great many suppose that by housing early they get rid of a large amount of labor in worming and suckering, forgetting that suckers come but twice on one leaf, and ripe tobacco is never injured by worms if kept clean while green. Tobacco cut green is chaffy and light lacks substance, richness, and flavor, although it is often smothered in. In topping, there can be no positive rule, as soil, condition, growth and weather have something to do with it. We are too apt to think it a great waste to take out considerable portion of top. By closely following the above suggestions, I think it possible to make as much money from one acre as is sometimes produced from three, and that's what we are after-at least we can have a croj: that we will be ashamed of when the shippers come round to inspect it and the yellow leg chickens. To sum upplant less, cultivate thoroughly, top low, let it get ripe, don't crowd in the barn, take pains, and you will in the end be amply paid for your trouble.

Is Culture a Sham?

N. Y. Herald. Λ great many people whose manners are irreproachable and whose lives are correct have had frequent occasion to fee! as a prominent preacher did last Sunday when he said that culture at times seemed a sham. Few words have lost their original meaning as completely as this word "culture" has done in late years. Once it signified, according to the dictionary, "enlightenment and discipline acquired by mental training," but now it means merely a smattering of things of no vital consequence to any one. Modern culture claims that it refines men and women. If it can prove that it does this it should be held in high esteem; but experience proves that ninety nine one-hundredths of what passes for refinement is the thinnest sort of polish-a mere gloss that can be applied at short notice to any coarse, rough or rotten material without any effect whatever upon texture. Culture is genuine only so far as something is cultivated. A man whose manner to his intimates is courteous and to others rude is not a cultured man; he is merely a boor who is smart enough to counterfeit true courtesy. In the best of men culture is only partial; in one the effort is confined to manners; in another to the affections; some devote most attention to their intellect, and a few men specially cultivate their moral sentiments. Any one of these has as good a right as any other to be considered cultured. A careful training of taste results in culture of taste and nothing else, for correct taste is quite as often found in discourteous, dishonest, selfish and immoral persons as in any others. All the dress, upholstery, music, pictures, bric-a-brac and blue china in the world cannot impart culture to any qualities but those that are attracted by these things and the literary sugar plums that pretend to be the whole of literature are equally ineffective outside of their own particular lines. The sooner the present generation realizes this the sooner a most disagreeable class of hypocrites will pass away. Culture, to be thorough, must begin at the bottom, and the foundation of all human improvement is personal character.
