THE FARM.

SEASONABLE HINTS FOR IT.

Advice from the Germantown Telegraph. Crops in England again promise an indifferent yield. The drought up to the early part of June, and cold easterly winds, seriously affected the cereal crops. The comparative poor harvest of last year, added to the depressing effects of the present prospect, has caused many farms to be vacated by tenants, about seventy per cent of whom, it is estimated, are in arrears for rent. The indications are that grain of all kinds will command advanced prices in England, and an increased quantity will be required from the surplus of

this country, which we can readily spare.
In certain California peach-drying establishments, the work of peeling the peaches has been much simplified by the following process: A crate filled with fruit is dropped into a vat containing hot lye, and there shaken. It is then removed to a tank of pure cold water and the lye is washed away. The skins of the fruit by this process become so separated from the pulp that they are drawn off with one motion of the hand. This saves much time, labor and expense. The new process causes the fruit to dry more readily, and a very slight loss in weight re-

When canteloupes become the size of a fist place under each one a piece of slate, to be obtained were a building is slated, or at the yard of the slater, or a piece of shingle will answer. This keeps the melon from contact with the ground and will prevent the ground from extracting the flavor from any portion of it, as is generally the case with watermelons and cante loupes which we buy in the markets, as we all know. For private domestic use, the little trouble which this protection gives is repaid a hundred fold in the excellence of the flavor of the fruit, and we think causes them to mature ear

Our gardens generally do not contain as good a variety of herbs as they should, for even the use of the family. This would seem strange when they are so convenient for the culinary department, and are so easily raised from the slip, but it must be from this year's growth. It is not too late yet if attended to without delay. To propagate in this way most of the herbs or seeds may be sown with good results. Formerly all the old, well established gardens of farmers, contained a full supply of all the various kinds, which were carefully dried in the shade, by which they retained their entire virtue until the next crop was ready for use.

Pruning Hedges. Evergreens as a rule are very sensitive to cold, cutting winds. Even the hard-ened leaves that have been exposed to all the vicissitudes of the weather often get injured by wintry winds; and this is more likely to be the case with those which are tender, as those inside, suddenly exposed to the weather by cutting away the outside, must be. No good hedgist cuts away evergreens till the winter is over, and all danger of cold winds is gone. This disposes of dedge pruning so far as evergreens are concerned, but in the case of deciduous hedges, which need a renovating pruning, it is not only allowable but sound practice. In this vicinity we have many of these decidnous things used as ornamental hedges. We have beech, thorn, Osage orange, honey locust, pyrus japonica and some other things of this character. Sometimes they are neglected, as our friend's evergreen hedge appears to be, and to renovate them they are often cut near the ground so as to induce them to throw out a large lot of new sprouts, which the next year can be trimmed into shape. This sort of trimming can be done at this season, and it is the only kind of hedge pruning that is at all seasonable. Hereabouts we leave the first evergreen pruning, hedges or other wise, till mid April, and the second as late as the beginning of November. Cheap Manure.

Geamantown Telegraph. When one goes to buy a farm his first concern is about cheap land. Next he considers how he can get cheap labor, and with these he is generally satisfied. Indeed, with many the price per acre is the main consideration. If a hundred and fifty dollars, say, be the ruling price per acre, and he can buy for a hundred, it is a chance if the bargain is not at once made.

It is not often that cheap manure is thought of, and yet we think it is of as much importance as all others. We have indeed heard it put it as a truism by farmers about Philadelphia—and put in a way as if assured of no contradiction—that no man could afford to pay more than \$150 per acre and thrive. It is looked on as wholly a matter of the price of land; but there can be no doubt that one can better afford to pay \$300 where manure is abundant and cheap, than \$150 where it is not to be had at any price.

There are men about all large cities who either farm or garden land worth several thousands of dollars an acre. They do not perhaps buy land at this figure and farm it; but their rent and perhaps taxes would represent the interest of this great sum. It is often said it is because they are near to market. They grow heavy articles that are costly to transport long distances, and the saving is here. There is some force in this; but little in comparison with the facility they enjoy in cheap manure. The country farmer has no idea of the richness of their lauds, and by which they can take off three or four crops of different articles a year.

We know many a country farmer who congratulates himself whenever there is a prospect of anything occurring near him that may increase the value of his land. This is all very well in its way. Yet we think many miss it by allowing calculations of such increase to enter into their heads to too great an extent. It keeps them from making improvements which might bear heavier crops, and which would bring in money more quickly and abundantly than any future increase in land. It tends to reduce agriculture to a real-estate speculation, rather than to continue it as them from making improvements which speculation, rather than to continue it as one great business of life. It would as a general thing be of far more profit for some business that tended to give the some business that tended to give the neighbor a chance at cheap manure to start near him than the most fashionable "country-seat" would be. Farmers are indeed often tempted to put the spare money into enterprises of mere show, on the plea of "improving" property, when they would hesitate about doing anything for industrial enterprises which might

help the crops rather than the land. These things seem so clear when pointed out as to make it appear hardly worth referring to; but we know too, many who have failed just here, many who have looked only to the price of land or the price of land and labor, and who have toiled on for years because there was no way to keep up the fertility of the land without great expense, that we are sure the remarks we have made will be generally useful.
