Germantown Telegraph. As we shall soon be thinking of getting the land ready for seeding, it may not be out of place to say a few words on the use of salt in its application to the wheatcrop. We know how it is with the animal world. A very little salt is to most persons quite agreeable. In a wild state animals will wander great distances to the salt licks to get a taste of the saline article, and all our domestic animals seem to enjoy it now and then. Most if not all plants contain a little of it, and those animals which do not take it in its distinct condition, take it into their systems through the plants they eat. In excess it is a great injury. Everybody knows this, It is just the same with plants. In proper proportions it is a benefit to vegetation. In excess it is one of the most

dangerous articles we can apply. It is to be regretted that more is no known about this subject. Some plants can take up a large amount of salt with positive benefit, others are satisfied with the veriest pinch, yet no one knows exactly what these plants are. Indeed, judging from the teachings from quite intelligent quarters, there seems to be no recognition of this vast difference. We see papers on "salt," as if it could be used alike for all things, and yet there are numberless things which even salt cannot save. True, some exception to this whole sale and indefinite recommendation of the use of salt is sometimes made in the case of asparagus. This we are told is especially agreeable to that plant; but we seldom see any special plant named besides this in the connection. It would be well worth while, we think, for those agricultural colleges which are engaged in the excellent work of experimenting, to go into this subject, and find out for us what it would do us so much good to know. It might possibly be that wonderful results little dreamed of now would result from such experiments. The quince is very much benefited by the use of salt, and from a case of which we know, we are much inclined to believe that similar excellent results would follow its use with the plum. As it is, the plum is not a success. The least injury rots it in warm climates. But as to the wheat crop, it is certainly a valuable aid in all light and dry soils, i

on it is impossible to say, as the quantity advantageous will vary with the soil. It is best to find out by care-by at first undergoing it-what the land will stand. A bushel to an acre will be enough for a first experiment, to be sown with or at the time of sowing the seed. That will do some good and no harm, and one can build on this in future after seeing how it Even as a "steep" it is found benefi-

The American express company has introduced into New York the system of harnessing three horses abreast, after the fashion of London omnibuses. The change has been made on two of the wagons for an experiment, with very satisfactory results. The wagons are supplied with two poles instead of one, and each of the three horses is attached to a separate whiffletree. This is found to be a decided improvement over the system sometimes used of putting one horse in shafts and another at each side. The harnessing is practically the same as with two horses, with two poles instead of one. The experiement is tried upon the wagons that deliver goods in the upper part of that city, not only because the loads are frequently too heavy for two horses, but to enable the drivers to make up for lost time with an increased rate of speed, when from any cause they are delayed at the start.
