Brooklyn, which came near causing serious injury to several persons. Mr. Thos. Rechford, the manager in Brooklyn for the new Mutual Union telegraph company, resides in the house. For several days there had been a leak in a water pipe in employee, volunteered, in the absence of to the defect, to solder the hole up with lead. Some rosin was pulverized and a bit of lead was procured, so that all the amatear plumber needed was a soldering iron. There were some old traps in the garret that had been left by a sea captain, and Corcoran searched among them, and felt that he was fortunate when he picked up an iron tool about eighteen inches long, shaped like a soldering iron and tipped with a triangular pointed end. He thought there were some unnecessary features about the tool for a modern soldering iron, but concluded that it might be a foreign tool or some patent arrangement. There seemed to be two sections to the iron, the top one being about the size of a gas pipe and screwed into the bottom one. Then there were several flaps of rubber fastened on the upper section at equal spaces. These seemed to be useless in the art of plumbing, but Mr. Coreoran didn't care what kind of a handle the tool had so long as it was all right at its business end.

He rubbed the point in rosin and, removing one corner of the range, shoved the iron into a bed of hot coals.
