On the Farm.

Renovating Old Orchards. W. P. Atherton, of Maine, in Germantown I once scraped and washed a dozen large Baldwin trees thirty years of age. It was considerable work to do it, and yet I think it paid, for there was an evident increase in growth, healthiness and fruitfulness. When I was a boy, my father frequently used to set me to work in the spring, on very wet or foggy day, scraping the trunks

of old apple trees. It wasn't very nice work for the eyes, and everybody that came along had to give an opinion as to the benefit or damage resulting from the operation, and as near as I can now remember, opinions were fabout equally divided. Be this as it may, my own judgment is that serious injury might result to a tree from a severe scraping at the wrong season of the year; but if performed in the warm months of spring, and a strong wash of soft soap or whale oil soap, or potash water, applied then, the results would be highly beneficial.

I do not know that I have anything new or interesting to write out; but for the benefit of your readers, allow me state what little experience I have had in the management of old orchards."

One old orchard on my place has not been plowed to my knowledge for thirtyfive years, and how much longer I do not know. It covers one and a half acres of ground, and is so situated as to receive over it a large portion of the wash from a road and from the barnyard opposite. From the latter source, however, the benefit is derived principally in the spring of the year. But wherever the rising of the ground has prevented the wash from flowing, frequent top-dressings have been applied, and thus the fertility of the land and the productiveness of the orchard kept up. No suckers have been allowed to grow up about the trunks of these trees, except when one is needed to preserve the line of descent; and the trees have been pruned every two or three years, generally in the month of November of December.

Another old orchard, a little less in extent and closely adjoining, but on dryer land, has been treated the same in regard to pruning aud top-dressing, the only difference being that it has been plowed two or three times, planted to corn or potatoes each time, and resecded the following year with grain crops. To plow a piece of ground two or three times in thirty-five years is certainly not very often; and to keep the land from running out it was topdressed occasionally, sometimes with barn yard manure and sometimes with a compost made of muck, manure, ashes and lime. It was with this compost that the laud was top-dressed some seven or eight years ago, and if I remember rightly it followed one of similar character made only three years before, but which had proved very unsatisfactory. This one also was disap pointing in its results; so much so, that] determined to plow the ground, and did so early in the fall of 1877, sowing to winterwheat, after dressing the land with a compost of nearly similar make, and about 800 pounds of ground bone added. The crop of wheat in 1878 was rather light on acit was heading and filling. No grass-seed was sown, but the clover and other grasses came in so strongly and grew so rapidly after the wheat was removed, that in the fall everybody thought the land had been seeded. The land was plowed again, and there was more grass to turn under than

In the spring of 1879, I spread over the ground and thoroughly worked in a heavy coat of well rotted horse and hog manure, and sowed to spring wheat. It was sowed as late as the 14th of June, and yet was so stout and lodged so badly, with quite a drought following, that a large part of the young grasses were killed out. In the spring of 1880, I sowed on a little more grass seed, and the hay crop that year was a good one; and this year (1881) we cut two tons to the acre, where a few years ago less than half that amount was cut, and that of a inferior quality. The old apple trees in this orchard were pruned in the fall-in December, I think-all the dead limbs and the majority of the suckers being removed. They were principally grafted fruit-Baldwins and Russetsthere being a few old natives left, and the apples on all these trees have been fairer and twice the size for two years from what they were formerly. Some of the trees were so heavily loaded that many of the limbs broke down.

at the first plowing, when the land seemed

actually hide-bound.

I know of one man near by here who renovated several old trees by digging circular trenches all about them as far as the limbs extended, and then partly filling them with manure and replacing the earth. He also mulched them heavily. The result was that the trees bore enormous crops and the fruit was twice, and in some cases, three times its former size. Some of his trees broke down under the extra strain put upon them. I have no doubt that frequent and moderate applications of manure to old orchards is a good thing; but I am not in favor of heavy or excessive manuring, as it tends to stimulate the tree too much, and a reaction is sure to follow, if they do not immediately break
