THE ELECTRIC TEST.

The Machine Which Traced the Builet. The induction balance used by Profs. Bell and Taintor, in its present improved form, consists of two flat coils, about four inches in diameter and one-half an inch in thickness of insullated copper wire ; a battery, a condenser, an interrupter or circuit breaker, and a telephone. The ends of the primary or inducing coil are connected with the poles of the battery, and in the same circuit are a condenser and a small interrupter, whose vibrating tongue open and closes the circuit with great rapidity. The ends of the scc-ondary coil in which the current is to be induced are carried to the binding posts of a bell telephone. When the connections have all thus been made, the secondary coil is laid on the primary or inducing coil, so that their respective cir-

cumferences exactly coincide. The circuit breaker is then set in motion, and the rapidly interrupted current through the primary coil induces another current of

higher intensity in the secondary coil, and as it does so a loud musical tone is heard in the telephone, with which the secondary coil is connected. As long as the current is maintained and the circumferences of

the two coils are kept in exact coincidence. the musical note in the telephone does not change its pitch or intensity. If, however, the experimeter slides the upper coil swimming in Lake Erie. the musical tone is diminished, and just in proportion as the centres of the flat coils are separated by a greater or less dis tance, the intensity of the musical tone is

lessened or increased. When the upper coil has been slidden over the lower, so that they simply overlap-the centre of one corresponding nearly with a point on the circumference of the other-the musical tone in the telephone ceases. If the upper coil be pushed a little farther

one side so that it overlaps still less, the tone is again heard. delicate manipulation it is possible to adjust the centres of the overlapping coils at such a distance one from the other that a perfect balance is brought about, and when this is the case the telephone makes no sound whatever. The centres of the overlapping coils cannot then be moved either toward or away from one another without causing the telephone to break its silence. When the coils are thus balanced what may be called the area of coincidence, or, in other words, the area of the overlapping parts of the two flat coils, has metal, and manifests its sensitiveness by of a low note in the telephone. STOPPING A RUNAWAY.

How a Luncaster Lady Averted an Accident

In the streets of Massa di Carrara. Italy, the other day, a deed of female heroism was done, with the particulars of which we are made acquainted through the columns of *It Frigido*, a paper published in that city. It seems that as Michael Carlo, the driver of a postal carriage or some other public conveyance. was passing through the streets he upset his vehicle in such a manner that he fell Sown upon the front of it and became jammed between the carriage and the horse. The animal, though not naturally vicious, was frightened at his struggles to extricate himself and started to run. An American lady, residing in the city, happening along and seeing his dange ran to his rescue and thoughtfully siezed the horse by his head. The man squirmed out, but with great difficulty got his legs from their entanglement in the wheels and harness, when the lady, well nigh exhausted by the strain upon her, seeing his escape, let go the horse and he ran a short distance and was caught by a dozen men, who by this time had come running to the scene. The rescued man and all the by-standers were loud in their gratitude and prises to her, and she has since received the more formal thanks of Carlo. The following card from him also appears in the Italian newspaper above named, of the date of July 3, with an editorial introduction.

"We very willingly give publicity to the following letter, and add our commenda-tions to Miss Blanche Nevin for the courage she displayed :

"MR.
