Medical aid was summoned, and but little hope was expressed that Grandma Garfield would recover, she seemed so utterly broken down. When the president came up to her bedside with a "Well, mother, how do you feel?" she answered him, "So badly, James, that I fear that I won't be long with you." "Oh, no, mother," he quietly said, "it is not as bad as that. Cheer up, the new president cannot part with his mother already." Very much to her own surprise, she rallied quickly, and in a few days she was talking about get ting away from the White House "and out of the atmosphere of the French cock-She used to say that fancy dishes would not help her any, and if she could only get home to her daughter in Ohio she knew they would give her something to eat, and she would soon well again. Home-made bread, made by an old, near neighbor, brought up to the White House to her daily, was what, she insisted, built her up any way before she left for Ohio. The same repugnance to fancy cooking has always been prominent with the president. No matter of what the breakfast consisted at the White House, he invariably ate a goodly portion of fried bacon every morning in the year, and at his dinner a piece of broiled steak would form the chief part of his meat diet. He has always been extremely methodical about his eating, and once knowing particular food agreed well with him, he did not ask for much variety in meeting a good appetite. Even during the last critical days the old taste is displayed in the preference he shows for the old fashioned milk porridge prepared by his wife and always a relished dish with

Party Reorganization. Abolish Senatorial Delegates.

Cambria Freeman. A good many suggestions have been

made by a number of Democratic papers of the state in regard to the adoption of rules for the organization of state conventions and other matters, to be prepared by the committee of seven named by Mr. Dill, chairman of the state committee, at its recent meeting in Harrisburg. This is a meet in most favorable time for doing what has been much too long neglected, and the composition of the committee, which consists of such well known Democrats as ticket. Wallace, Randall, Barr, Hensel, Myers, Barger and Whitman, with Mr. Dill as duty imposed upon them will be well and to the harmony and best interests of the party. We do not propose for the reason just stated to discuss at length the ques ions that will be considered by the commit tee, but will briefly refer to one of them, as we did a year or two ago, when the Harris-burg Patriot called attention to the subject. We agreed then with the Patriot and still agree with it in saying, that whatever necessity may have existed before the adoption of the new constitution for the election of senatorial delegates to a state convention, there is not a particle of reason for their election at the present time. Each county has now its separate representation in the Legislature and as a necessary consequence its separate representation in a state convention, and the original reason for the existance of a senatorial representation in a state convention having fallen, the custom of electing them ought to fall with it. Senatorial delegates being therefore purely ornamental, the committee, we trust, will recommend to the Williamsport state convention that in the future they be abolished.
