A Well-known Physician Deceased. Dr. D. D. Kennedy, a well-known physician, aged 42, and for more than 25 years a practitioner in and about Oxford, died at his home in that borough a few days ago and will be buried to-morrow. He was a son of Dr. John Kennedy, a distinguished physician of his day, and his mother was a sister of Mr. Thos. Dickey. Dr. Kennedy was a son-in-law of the late James Patterson, of Little Britain : his wife died some seven years ago. Dr. K. was well known and had a wide circle of friends and relatives by marriage in the lower end of this county.

COURT OF COMMON PLEAS.

BETTER THAN FOR TEN DAYS.

ON THE ROAD TO RECOAERY,

Condition Encouraging this Morning. ELBERON, N. J., Sept. 8 .- 8:30 a. m .-Official-At the morning examination. made at eight oclock, the president's pulse was 104, temperature 98.7, respiration 18. He was restless and wakeful during the early part of the night, but after 12, midnight, slept well until morning. He general condition appears more encouraging. D. W. BLISS, F. H. HAMILTON.

Better than for Ten Days Past. ELBERON, N. J., Sept. 8.-9:20 A. M.-Dr. Bliss says the patient is in better condition this morning than he has been for 10 days, his pulse is 104, temperature and respiration about normal. Filed 10:15 a.

Better News Promised. Long Branch, Sept. 8.—The president's physicians are much encouraged this morning. Dr. Bliss said the patient is now better than for eight or ten days past, and there will be still better news in a day or two. To-day is not quite so warm as yes. terday, but cooler weather is anxiously ooked for.

Longing for Cooler Weather. Long Branch, N. J., Sept. 8, 12:15 p. m .- Reports from the president continue favorable. Some apprehension is felt, however, on account of the continued hot weather, and it is feared unless we got a sea breeze soon, that the afternoon febrile rise will cause the temperature to increase again, and render the patient's concition more unsatisfactory towards night. The cabinet are much encouraged with this morning's bulletin, but are among the number who are auxiously awaiting cooler weather. Remarks such as "Fate seems to be against the president", and 'How is it possible for him to improve with such unfavorable weather?" are heard on all sides. Large numbers of ex cursionists arrived this morning and the avenues present-an appearance such as is customary at the height of the season.

Ground for Encouragement. ELBERON, N. Dr. Bliss Says He is Convalescent. LONG BRANCH, Sept. 8 .- 12:50 P. M. The favorable condition of the president at the noon examination continues, and has had the effect of cheering all hearts. The feeling in all quarters is changed from anxiety to most sanguine opinions that the president has at last fairly started on the road to recovery. Dr. Bliss is authority for the statement that the president is convalescent. He made this assertion in the presence of Dr. Hamilton. The latter gentleman, who strictly adheres to his policy not to talk for publication about any of his patients, showed by his expression that he did not object to the statement. Secretary Windom was informed by a representative of the associated press of the result of Dr. Bliss's examination at noon and at the conclusion thereof made the remark that "that was splendid."

THE MICHIGAN FIRES.

Shocking Loss of Life—The Werst Not Yet Told. DETROIT, Sept. 8.—Telegraphic commu nication is entirely cut off with the worst parts of the burnt region, so reports are fragmentary, and it is hoped exaggerated, but there are many fears that the worst is far from having been told. The complete lestruction of Richmondville is confirmed. The villages of Carson, Charleston, Sanilacco and Tyre are reported to be completely destroyed, and Ashley partly so. The townships of Delaware, Nunken, Austin, in Sanilacco, and Bingham, Sherman and Paris, in Huron county, are burned over and desolated. The crops in these townships were all harvested, and nearly all are now lost.

The remains of a family of seven named Redmond were found in a well near Charleston, they having entered the well for shelter, and being there suffocated. The charred remains of Henry Cole were also found at Charleston, and a family named Susula, in Paris township, and a Mrs. Diebert and three children were tion. overtaken by the flames and burned to

In Watertown township another family named Dennison have, it is believed, been burned. Two families named Thornton and Lee, it is feared, fell a prey to the fiames near Richmondville. There was a gale carrying the fire with a rapidity that often prevented escape. Yesterday afternoon the direction of the wind changed and this, it is feared, will add new destruction by sending the flames over the sections that have escaped. It was much cooler last night, which is in that respect favorable but the wind is high and the country help less. There are no signs of rain, without which there seems to be no deliverance.

Magee and Quay in an alcove of the library room fixed up the order of business for the convention.

A majority of all the delegates of the convention having been ascertained present Magee reported George Oliver to nominate Quay for temporary chairman. Persons were also designated for chairmanships of the various committees, that on contested seats being composed of the sacred and convenient number of seven. Gilfillan is to nominate Gen. Harry White for the permanent chairmanship of the convention and Attorney General Palmer will present the name of Bailey for state contest which he has devised to oust an Independent from the Schuylkill delegation, the caucus adjourned. Stober was named for state committee from the upper district, and John H.
