There is no more tobacco in the country than we need, the new crop is no larger than its predecessor, so therefore who is to hinder holders of leaf from making their own figures on the goods? Sampling of '80 stock has been going on quite extensively during the week. The samples do not indicate that the various crops have undergone a change for the better or worse. Pennsylvania, as a rule, does not show well at all, but as manufacturers want it, it may safely be inferred that they will find some way of their own to make it look well. Connecticut shows excellently, but still remains comparatively neglected. When once the Pennsylvania is thoroughly picked, Connecticut, we have no doubt, will begin to play an important role in the market. Of Wisconsin Havana seed little is in the market, and it finds buyers almost as soon as offered. In fact there are a few firms of manufacturers who make a speciality of working this tobacco, and these are almost the only buyers. Wisconsin broad leaf also appears in very diminutive quantities in the market, and

A N ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE

To provide against injuries to the roadway, in the streets and alleys of the city of Lancaster, from defective or careless illing of excavations and diggings therein.
Section I. Be it ordained by the Select and Common Councils of the City of Lancaster, that from and after the passage of this ordinance, no person or persons whatsoever shall dig up or excavate the roadway in any of the streets or alleys of the City of Lancaster, for laying water, gas or sewer pipes, or making connections with or repairs to the same, or for any other purpose whatsoever, without having first obtained a permit for so doing from the Mayor of said City.

Sec. 2. That any person or persons digging or excavating in any of the said streets or alleys, by virtue of any such permit, shall be required, on filling in such excavation or digging, to ram or puddle the earth filled in, and snall remove any surplus or supply any deficiency of material as may be necessary to leave the roadway even and solid, and in as good condition as it was before such digging, and shall keep such part of the roadway in repair for the period of six months. In case any excavation remain open over night the person making the same shall display a red light as a signal of danger.

Sec. 3. That in case of default on the part of

Sec. 3. That in case of detault on the part of any person or persons making such excavation, or digging, to fill up the same in the man ner required by Section 2, the Street Commissioner shall give notice to the person or persons at whose instance or for whose benefit such excavation or digging was made, of the default, and if such person or persons shall refuse or neglect for two days after being so notified, to repair the roadway, in the manner required by Section 2, then the Street Commissioner shall make such repairs, at the expense of the said person or persons for whose benefit, or at whose instance, the excavation or digging was made, and the expenses incurred, or at whose instance, the excertaint of degring was made, and the expenses incurred, together with a penalty of twenty per cent. shall be recoverable, in an action of dett, at the suit of the City of Lancaster, as cebts of like amount are now recoverable.

SEC. 4. That in all cases of contracts entered into by any of the departments of the governinto by any of the departments of the govern

of said City, with any person or persons, for work which will render necessary any excavation in the roadway, in any of the streets or alleys of said City, the contractor shall be bound by recognizance to repair said roadway, as required by Section 2 of this ordinance, and no final estimate for any such work shall be represent by the person committee until and no final estimate for any such work shall be approved by the proper committee until the contractor shall have produced a certificate from the Street Commissioner that Section 2 has been fully complied with.

Sec. 5. That any person or persons digging up the roadway, in any of the streets or alleys of said city, without having first obtained the permit provided for in Section 1, shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars, to be collected in an action of debt, in the name of the City of Lancaster, before any Alderman of said City.

Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the Mayor of the City to procure, at the expense of the City. Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the Mayor of the City to procure, at the expense of the City, printed blank forms of such permits, and to fill and issue the same, on personal applica-tion, agreeably to the first section of this Ordi-nance, and also to retain a list of every permit issued, with the number and date thereof, the location of the proposed excavation or digging, and the name of the person or persons, for whose benefit or at whose instance the same is to be done.
