MILLERSVILLE.

Secretary Francis Explains Why Messrs. Myers and Wittmer Were Expelled from the Normal School Grounds.

"F." in the New Era.

On Saturday night your neighbors of the INTELLIGENCER indulged in one of their characteristic, intermittent discharges of filthy matter, directing the nozzle of their machine, as they did many times before, when they indulged in their dirty work, right in the face of the Normal school and its trustees. It is the settled policy of the Normal not to notice these squirts, and I do not intend to notice them on her account, or on account of the trustees, taking upon myself personally whatever odium may attach to not notice them.

Your correspondent has been actively identified with the Normal for more than twenty years, almost from its very infancy. He had an opportunity for learning its history, and he is a greater part of it, and thank God, he is ready to explain (and thereby only echoing the public sentiment of Pennsylvania and the world), Millersville Normal, first in the battle, and its flag still flying aloft in the vanguard of popular education and advanced methods of teaching. "Thy brow is wreathed with laurel!"

The only excuse for the editors of the INTELLIGENCER writing about the Normal as they do, is that they are absolutely ignorant of what they write about. This is a pretty good excuse, and it is a mistake. But should their local reporters begin that kind of business, either manufacturing from the whole cloth or reporting upon such authority as the editors write upon, they would be furnished with passports of honor, and they would be as they please. If they make themselves ridiculous or silly it may be said it is nobody's business. I am sure it is none of mine. But, as to the matter of information, I don't think any living man that ever was or is, or will be, Normal ever entered the office of the INTELLIGENCER to give them any information.

The best evidence of disloyalty to the school, in those connected with it, is loitering about that office, where congregate the disaffected, the incendiary rebels, nihilists, law-breakers, infra-actors, and lawless relations, those who after failing to accomplish their wicked designs at the school, in defiance of its authorities, when detected by the ever watchful eye of the master, and perhaps expelled or suspended or put under some other form of punishment for their misdeeds—these congregate there. They are received with open arms, and the odds ever ready to minister to their wants or redress their grievances with open columns, by inserting windy and venomous communications, having a large measure of editorial. These disaffected spirits make this office their roosting place, where, during their sickness, they spew out corruption and the editors serve it up for their readers. But, all the manipulation of these dirty goods, cannot deprive it of its inherent and inseparable foulness.

Nothing would be regarded by me as a more noble act in the interest of the Normal than the exclusion of the editors themselves from the grounds, and the buildings, while they seem to think it would be horrible. I think a man has no business anywhere unless he has legitimate objects in going there. To go to a place or send an emissary, to annoy or embarrass the welfare of religious or educational institutions is reprehensible. I am now speaking hypothetically.

New Method of Paying Employees. Heretofore the Pennsylvania railroad company has been in the habit of paying its army of employees at the end of each month with checks, each of which had, of course, to have a two-cent revenue stamp attached. Although this may seem a little matter, it amounted in the course of a year to several thousands of dollars, and in consequence the company has of late been giving the matter considerable attention and a plan has been devised by which this expense may be done away with. Under the new order of things a check will be drawn, which, according to authorized interpretation of the revenue law, does not require a stamp. It will be in the form of a receipt, and the disbursements of the company to pay from the funds of the company at a certain bank a stated sum to the party named. The old form was an order on the bank to pay, while the new draft is a certificate that one of the company's own officers will make the disbursements. In the view of the law the new form of payment is not a check requiring a stamp. The matter having been submitted to the law department of the Pennsylvania railroad company, counsel for the company communicated to the commissioner of internal revenue, who has decided that the revised form of check will require no stamp.
