

ANOTHER GOOD DAY.

NO DISTURBING SYMPTOMS UNINTERRUPTED PROGRESS.

The Patient Again in His Easy Chair.

A SERIES OF FAVORABLE REPORTS.

The Morning Bulletin Favorable.

LONG BRANCH, Sept. 14.—A. M.—Official.

At the examination of the president at 8:30 this morning his temperature was 98.4, pulse 100, respiration 19.

He passed the night comfortably, sleeping sufficiently; he is bright and cheerful this morning, and has taken fruit and his first meal for the day with relief.

Not a Single Disturbing Symptom.

ELBERON, N. J., Sept. 14.—Dr. Bliss says the president passed a good night and awoke refreshed this morning.

The fever came on about 1 a. m. and commenced passing off before six.

At the time of the morning dressing the temperature was normal and the respiration 19.

The president commences the day as favorably as yesterday and has not a single disturbing symptom.

For breakfast, among other things, he ate nearly a whole peach and appeared to relish it.

The weather continues very desirable and is invigorating. It is perfectly clear, excepting on the ocean, where a beautifully tinted haze prevails, rendering the scene pleasant and refreshing.

A representative of the associated press in conversation with Dr. Bliss immediately after the issuance of the morning bulletin, inquired as to what length of time the president would probably remain at Long Branch.

In reply the doctor said probably until the middle of October, that if this favorable condition continues, and the several lesions healed satisfactorily as he believed they would, the president would rally very rapidly, and that in such event he thought a voyage to the southern coast on the Tallapoosa would be desirable and beneficial.

Should the president make the request to-day, he will again be placed in his reclining chair for a short time.

10:30 A. M.—When first taken this morning before the dressing the president's pulse was 100; a short time afterward it fell to 104, and at the morning dressing it indicated 109.

At this hour it has decreased to 98.

The Pulse Still Trilling.

ELBERON, Sept. 14.—Dr. Bliss says the pulse balls referred to as having been opened yesterday were so trifling that he did not consider the fact sufficiently important to mention. They were not boils, he says, but what might be termed acne of the surface, and were simply pricked with a pin.

Secretary Lincoln Sees the President.

ELBERON, Sept. 14.—11:45 a. m.—Secretary Lincoln just saw the president. He says he expected to see a very ill man and that his expectations were realized.

He had not seen the president since the afternoon he was shot, and of course a great change had taken place since that time.

The conversation between the gentlemen was very brief and entirely personal, no business being referred to at all. The secretary only remained in the sick room about sixty seconds. At this hour the favorable conditions continue.

At the request of Attorney General MacVeigh the temporary track from the Central railroad of New Jersey to the Franklin cottage will not be removed at present.

Enjoying His Easy Chair.

ELBERON, N. J., Sept. 14.—12:30 A. M.—The president has been safely removed to his easy chair, and is enjoying the scene very much.

After he had comfortably settled down in his chair he expressed a sense of gratification and remarked, "This should have been commenced three weeks ago."

The patient will remain in his chair until he requests to be returned to his bed—his head elevated to an angle of about 25 degrees.

Back to Bed.

ELBERON, Sept. 14, 2 P. M.—The president has just been removed from his reclining chair to his bed, after remaining in the chair for an hour and a half, during which time he had a quiet nap.

His head was elevated and his feet permitted to drop to about an angle of 30 degrees. Dr. Bliss says he was rather reticent about bringing him back to bed. The disturbance did not change the pulse or temperature. At this hour his pulse is 104, temperature 98.8, respiration 19.

THE "SACRED LEGION."

An Organization to Defend the Life of the Czar.

LONDON, Sept. 14.—The Morning Post says it is stated that 3,000 Russian nobles have organized themselves under the name of the "Sacred Legion's" counter association to the nihilist attempts on the life of the Czar. They will dispose of large funds and employ a complete system of secret organization and their influence at court is said to be much superior to the ordinary secret police.

MURDEROUS ASSAULT.

A Man Strained with a Shotgun.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 14.—A special dispatch to the Post from Pierce City, says Chas. T. Harris was passing the house of Ward Hubbard last evening, when the latter came out with a shotgun, and fired a terrible blow over the right eye, crushing his skull and causing instant death. No cause is assigned for the deed. Hubbard gave himself up to the authorities.

SOME PRAYERS FOR THEM THAT WERE BEHELD BY US.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 14.—At the regular noon prayer meeting at the hall of the Young Men's Christian association, yesterday, after prayer had been offered for the sufferers by the Michigan forest fire, the suggestion was made that if they expected the Lord to hear prayers of the sort not backed up by coin, they were badly mistaken, as he did not do business that way.

A subscription was at once started and \$100 collected, which is expected will be increased probably to \$500. The amount collected was telegraphed to Mayor Carlton, Port Huron, as the first installment from San Francisco.

Insupportable Suffering.

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—The following telegram was received by the president of the Michigan fire relief committee in this city:

"PORT HURON, Mich., Sept. 14.—Have just emerged from the burnt district have traveled over 75 miles of roads in it. The suffering and devastation are indescribable. The scorched and blackened places are everywhere. The land once occupied by comfortable homes and a prosperous people, scarcely anything is visible but what seems a boundless sea of ashes, from which arises a stifling odor of burning flesh and bones. The burned and fire-damaged supplies come through slowly, especially at a distance from the shore and railway. A man is asked the whereabouts of his wife and children, and he starts with a gasp and a load of bread, and leaps away like a wild beast. Almost hourly the names of additional victims are added to the burned and to the death list. The homeless are thousands. The blind, the scorched, the crippled and the deformed are very, very many. My own relations are very, very many. My abundance to spare for others. They are all alive, but my mother and my brother will I fear lose their eyesight. Woeful want prevails and bread is hard to supply. For God's sake let not the blessed hand of charity be too soon stayed in New York."

Mr. Crosby stated that the committee forwarded over \$1,500 to Michigan this morning and that \$5,000 would be sent this afternoon.
