A Blackbird Roost.

An Interesting Daily Sight near Troy.

Many of our citizens have noticed large flocks of blackbirds that daily enter the city from the north and east and fly towards Mount Ida. These birds attracted the attention of a reporter, and he resolved to find their roost. They apparently all come from the country to the northeast of the city, and seem to have a common trysting place. Ascending the hill on Congress street the birds were seen to alight on the trees in the grounds attached to Ida cottage, owned by the Warrens, and on enterthe premises Mr. Eisenlohr, gardener in charge, accompanied reporter to the roost. Though one little blackbird cannot make much noise, yet when tens of thousands are holding a cancus and imitating the Democracy, their voices are well calculated to quiet a speaker. Each of the little creatures seemed desirous of occupying the particular twig of its neighbor. Gradually, as the sun sank behind the western hills, the twittering, nestling and chirping ceased, and, except when an occasional shrill note or fluttering sound told that some unfortunate had been crowded off its roost, all was quiet. Shortly after sunrise the birds commence the flight to fields ascending with a whir resembling the noise of a hundred saw mills. They return home in scattered detachments. and leave in more compact bodies, frequently in one immense flock, which sometimes actually casts a shadow of darkness over the earth below. They continue their flight together some distance into the country, when they divide into smaller flocks and go in all directions in search of food. From the fact that they are Don't generally found in large numbers near grain fields it is supposed that grain is their principal food, and from the crops of a few of them examined by a reporter the supposition was verified. Each crop was filled with grain and the amount eaten by a bird was over half an ounce. This would give a bushel a day for every 1,920 allowing them one meal of half an oance of grain each per day. Estimating the number of this roost at 20,000, 10 bushels of grain per day would be consumed in feeding them. It will be readily computed what it costs to maintain this feathered army for a season. It is a question if they pay for their food by the destruction of insects.

The Spider and the Mouse.

A curious spectacle was to be seen on Monday in the office of Clever's livery stable in Lebanon, Ky. Against the wall of the room stands a tolerably tall desk, and under this a small spider, not larger than a common pea, had constructed a web reaching to the floor. that the spider had ensnared a young mouse by passing filaments of her web around its When first seen the mouse had its hind feet off the floor, and could barely touch the floor with its fore feet. The spider was full of business, running up and down the line, occasionally biting the monse's tail, making it struggle desperately. Its efforts to escape were unavailing, as the slender filaments about its tail were too strong for it to break. In a short time it was seen that the spider was slowly hoisting its victim into the air.

At 9 o'clock at night the mouse was still alive, but made no sign except when the spider descended and bit its tail. At this time it was an inch and a half from the floor.

The news of the novel sight soon be came circulated, and hundreds of people visited the stable to witness it. The mouse is a small one probably less than half grown, measuring about one and a half inches from the point of its nose to the root of its tail.
