A Perpetual Ice-tiorge.

Where Cae Would be Unpleasantly Cool on the Hettest Summer Day. Within an hour's drive from Newton, N. J. may be witnessed one of the strangest sights in this country—a perpetual ice-gorge. This gorge exists at the foot of the Blue mountains, back of Swattswood Lake and Middleville, and is but a few miles west of Newton. The gorge is several hundred yards in extent, from ten to thirty feet deep, with numerous caves and clefts in the rock where the ice lies. The main gorge is located but a short distance from the mountain, and the shade at that spot is very dense, the sun apparently never penetrating it. The entire bottom of the gorge is covered with thick, clear ice, and the crevices and caves are filled with it. That it is a natural ice house there can be no doubt; hundreds of tons might be taken out without appreciably decreasing the quantity. Much of this great mass has doubtless lain there for years, the ice gradually melting on top and being added to each year. The thermometer, which during the recent drought and "hot spell" registered 103 degrees in Newton, marked just 38 degrees at the same time at the bottom of the gorge too cold for a person to remain there any length of time. A few feet from one end of the gorge a spring of the most delicious sparkling water bubbles up through the ice. It tastes slightly of iron and is very satisfactory te the thirst. This water stands at thirty-four degrees-about as cold as one could comfortably drink it.

Samuel Thompson, who owns the farm on which this natural curiosity has been found, said when asked about the gorge by a reporter: "Why, yes, I 'spose it is rather remarkable, though we never set no store by it, 'cept when we wanted ice. The neighbors all goes there when they wants ice and 'tain't necessary for t' build any ice houses 'round here. Early in the spring th' gorge is filled clean to the top with clear ice, but long in the summer it gets melted down, but then they's allers tons and tons o' ice thar au' they hez been ever since I kin rem'ber. Ye see, th' water runs down offen th' mountain inter that holler during th' fall and as they aint much outlet it jest stays thar an' freezes. I 'spose some o' th' ice in that thar cave has been thar forever. The water in the spring, though, is mighty good tastin', and my wife sets great store by it, 'cause H. D. LONGAKER, M. D., she says 't powerful good fer rheumatiz. We hev knowed 'bout the gorge fer years, but ez I reckoned they was pleuty jest like it 'round the country I never said much about th' ol thing. Yes, they hez been a good many people 'round here t' see th' spring this summer, but mostly city chaps that was boardin' over t' Nowton an' come out jest t' see th' sight." Mr. Thompson has been offered large sums of money by enterprising capitalists for the gorge, but declines to sell, as he is wealthy and thinks the property is worth just as much to him as it would be to some one else.

Murder Brought to Light.

A Farmer Accused of Murdering a Friend in 1877 to Whom He Owed \$3,000. In 1876 a well known citizen of Lincoln, Placer county, Cal., named Singleton, disappeared. A farmer named Niles, a re spected citizen and now a resident of Sacramento, owed Singleton \$3,000. Singleton visited Niles to collect the money, and the two men visited Sheridan, in the same county, together. From that day Singleton has not been seen. The men were old friends, having crossed the plains togeth-er. Niles's statement that Singleton went to Arizona was accepted and believed by the community. Soon after the disap-pearance of Singleton, Niles filled up an abandoned well near his house. Latterly some property belonging to Singleton has been seen in Niles's possession, especially a gold watch which is known to have be longed to the missing man. The few neighbors who remembered the circumstances of the disappearance and the filling of the well connected the two circumstances together. Niles had sold the farm and the new proprietor consented that the well should be opened to its old depth. This was done on Thursday and Friday last. The body of Singleton was found at the bottom of the well. The high respectability of Niles, the popularity of Single-ton, and the prominent relations sustained by both to the community invest the case with most exciting interest. A despatch from Wheatland announces that Niles was arrested, charged with the murder of Singleton. Niles refused to make a statement and was taken to Lincoln.
