THE DEAD PRESIDENT.

LANCASTER'S MOURNING MEETING.

Large Gathering of Citizens in the Cour

In response to a proclamation issued by his honor Mayor MacGonigle, the citi-zens of Lancaster assembled in the court house last evening to give expression to their grief at the death of President Garfield. The assemblage was a very large and representative one. Mayor MacGonigle in calling the meet-

ing to order spoke substantially as follows:

lows: The time having arrived for the organi-zation of this meeting I would ask those present to come to order. The object of our assembling is understood by all here. The chief magistrate of the United States, James A. Garfield, lies cold in death, cut of in the year prime and yier of his man off in the very prime and vigor of his man-hood by the bullet of the assassin; a career of the most promising rule closed and our people, sitting down in confidence again given over to apprehension and to the feeling, born of the assassin's stroke, of insecurity. that in a government of the people the two most, distinguished examples in the civil life of the republic of men who had risen by their own unaided exertions from the humblest walks of life to the highest position of honor and trust within the gift of the nation, and both eminent for their devotion to popular rights, should fall victims to the hands of assassins.

Resolved, That in the life of James A Garfield, every American youth may read the possibilities to be achieved by the cultivation of correct principles, strict fidelity to every duty, and untiring industry; and, in his patience and fortitude through weeks of suffering, when daily confront-ing death with calmness, all should learn a lesson of that Christain faith which was the brightest jewel in the crown of his virtues
